An Act to allow further time to complete the
issuing and locating of Military Land Warrants.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the authority granted to the Secretary of the Department of War, by an act, approved the twenty-fourth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, to issue warrants for the military land bounties, to persons entitled thereto, shall be revived and continued in force for the term of five years.
Approved—May 26, 1824.

To allow the bounty to vessels employed in the
Cod Fisheries, in certain cases.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That any vessel which shall be licensed according to law, for the cod fishery, and which shall have completed her fishing term, according to the provisions of law, and thereby entitled to the allowance of bounty, shall, in returning to any port within the United States, be wrecked or lost, the owner or owners, and crew of such vessel, shall, on satisfactory proof being made to the Comptroller of the Treasury, of the wreck or loss of such vessel, be entitled to the same bounty as would have been allowed, had such vessel returned to port.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That any vessel which shall have completed her fishing term, subsequent to the act, entitled "An act in addition to and alteration of an act, entitled 'An act laying a duty on imported salt, granting a bounty on pickled fish exported, and allowance to certain vessels employed in the fisheries,'" passed the third of March, one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, and which shall, in returning to any port in the United States, have been wrecked or lost, the owner or owners, and crew, of such fishing vessel, shall have extended to them the provisions of the first section of this act.
Approved—May 26th, 1824.

An Act to alter the times of holding the Circuit
and District Courts of the United States for
the District of South-Carolina.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That instead of the times now established by law, the Circuit Court for the District of South-Carolina, shall annually be holden as follows, to wit: at Charleston on the second Tuesday of April, and at Columbia on the third Tuesday of November.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That all suits, actions, writs, processes, and other proceedings, which are now pending in said Circuit Court, at the times and places heretofore established, shall be returnable to, heard, tried and determined, in the said Circuit Court, at the times and places hereby respectively established for the holding thereof.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That from and after the passing of this act, the times of holding the District Courts of the United States at Laurens Court-house, South-Carolina, shall be so altered, that the said court shall hereafter convene on the Tuesday next ensuing, after the adjournment of the Circuit Court of the United States at Columbia.
Approved—May 25, 1824.

An Act to authorize masters of vessels, in
certain cases, to clear out either at the
Custom House of Petersburg, or that of
Richmond.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That any ship or vessel, owned by, or consigned to any person or persons in

the collection district of Richmond, and which shall be loaded, in whole or in part, in the district of Petersburg, by such owner or owners, consignee or consignees, may be cleared out by the Collector of the district of Richmond, on application of the owner, consignee or captain of such ship or vessel: *Provided,* That the entire cargo shall be bona fide taken or shipped from the district of Richmond.
Approved—May 23, 1824.

An Act concerning invalid Pensions.
Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of War be, and he is hereby directed, to place the following persons on the pension list of invalid pensioners of the United States, who shall be entitled to, and receive pensions, according to the rates, and commencing at the times, hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:

Andrew Gorril, at the rate of eight dollars per month; to commence on the third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one.

James Wilson, at the rate of four dollars per month; to commence the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three.

William Parker, Rock, and Thomas, three Seneca Indians, residing at Buffalo, in the state of New-York, at the rate of four dollars per month, each, to commence the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three.
Approved—19th May, 1824.

An Act to fix the Western boundary line of
the Territory of Arkansas, and for other
purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Western boundary line of the territory of Arkansas shall begin at a point forty miles west of the southwest corner of the state of Missouri, and run south, to the right bank of the Red river, and thence, down the river, and with the Mexican boundary, to the line of the state of Louisiana, any law heretofore made, to the contrary notwithstanding.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the sum of two thousand dollars, to defray the expense of running and marking said boundary line, to be expended under the directions of the President of the United States, be, and the same hereby is, appropriated, to be paid out of any money in the Treasury, not otherwise appropriated.

Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That so much of the appropriation of sixty-five thousand dollars, made by the act of the 3d of March, eighteen hundred and twenty-one, for carrying into effect the treaty of the eighteenth of October, eighteen hundred and twenty, with the Choctaw [Choctaw] Indians, as remains, unexpended, shall, under the direction of the President of the United States, be employed for the purposes mentioned in the said act of 3d of March, eighteen hundred and twenty-one, any law to the contrary notwithstanding.

Sec. 4. And be it further enacted, That the sum of ten thousand dollars, to be paid out of any money in the Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, be, and the same is hereby, appropriated, to defray the expenses of treating with the Choctaw [Choctaw] Indians, to obtain a modification of the treaty of October eighteenth, one thousand eight hundred and twenty.
Approved—May 26, 1824.

An Act to receive and extend the term of
certain pensions, which have expired by
limitation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the pensions heretofore granted, and paid out of the Privateer Pension Fund, to the widows and orphans of such officers, seamen, and marines, as were slain, or died in consequence of wounds, or casualties, received while in the line of their duty, on board the private armed ships of the U. States, and the terms for the payment of which had expired by limitation, before the ninth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, be, and the same are hereby, revived, and extended to such widows and orphans, with all the advantages, and in the same manner, as if their respective terms had not expired; subject to the provisions, restrictions, and limitations, of an act, passed on the ninth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, entitled "An act extend-

ing the term of pensions granted to persons disabled, and to the widows and orphans of those who have been slain, or who have died in consequence of wounds, or casualties, received while in the line of their duty, on board the private armed ships of the U. States, during the late war."
Approved, May 26, 1824.

An Act granting a tract of land to the inhabi-
tants of the Parish of Point Coupee, on cer-
tain conditions.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the right of the United States, to a tract of land, forty arpens front, upon the Mississippi river, and running back the depth of forty arpens, at a remarkable bend on said river, be, and the same is hereby, granted to the inhabitants of the Parish of Point Coupee, within which said land is situated, on condition that said Parish shall, at all times, hereafter, keep a good and sufficient levee in front of said land, upon the river Mississippi; and, if they should at any time hereafter, cease to keep up such good and sufficient levee, the land shall revert to the United States.
Approved, May 26, 1824.

The Celebrated Race Horse,

WASHINGTON, will stand the present season at my stable in Warrenton, and be let to mares at twenty-five dollars for the season, payable on the 1st day of January next.
Washington's Pedigree and Performances are excelled by no other horse; a full description of them cannot now be given, suffice it to say that he was gotten by the celebrated horse Timoleon out of the famous running mare Ariadne, by Citizen, her dam by Wind air.
Washington was engaged in four Sweepstakes, two mile heats, two hundred dollars entrance, when he was three years old. Three of them he won, beating in one of them the celebrated Horse Henry; the other he lost, after winning the first heat, he lost the second heat by a bad start, whereby he lost at least eighty yards; being in bad order he was then withdrawn, although he only lost the second heat by a few feet.
Last spring he was lame in one of his hind legs, and on y run at Newmarket, for a Handicap, two mile heats, Three started, and he was beaten by Sir William. Washington won the first heat, Sir William won the second and third. The second heat was run in better time than it was ever run at Newmarket. Sir William had ten pounds taken off his weight in this race. Washington lost sixty yards by a bad start in the second heat, and he only lost the heat by a length. Last fall he won the Proprietor's Purse at Newmarket, three mile heats, three hundred dollars. The first heat in this race, was two seconds faster than it was ever run there before. He was then carried to Baltimore, where he won the Proprietor's Purse of five hundred dollars, three mile heats, beating the celebrated Running Horse Flying Childers; but had the misfortune to get one of his fore legs injured. He was trained this spring, and run at Newmarket and won the Jockey Club Purse of six hundred dollars, four mile heats, beating with ease Mr. Winn's Mare Squirt, and Capt. Harrison's Horse Aramis.
Washington is not withdrawn from the turf; but it is thought necessary to give him rest, as his leg is not supposed to have recovered its full strength. He will stand the next season also, and those putting Mares this season which do not prove with foal, will have the privilege of putting them next season, gratis, provided the property of such Mare is not changed.
