Mr. M'Lead presented his written protest against the passage of the bill altering the present made of electing Sheriffs, and vesting the right thereof in the people. Mr. M'Leod observes, that he thus formally opposes the bill, that his fellow citizens and posterity. may witness his willingness to avert the manifold evils that will inevitably attend its practice.

The amendment proposed in the House of Commons, to the bill authorizing the making of a Turnpike Road from the Saluda Gap in Buncombe to the Tennessee line, having been concurred in by the Senate, the same was read and releved to be enrolled. It is therefore a law.
