An act making appropriations for the support of Government, for the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five.
Concluded.
For compensation to the Commissioners of the Navy Board, ten thousand five hundred dollars.
For compensation to the Secretary to the Commissioners of the Navy Board, two thousand dollars.
For compensation to the clerks in the office of the Commissioners of the Navy Board, per act of twentieth of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, three thousand five hundred and fifty dollars.
For compensation of clerks and a draftsman, per act of twenty-sixth May, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, four thousand dollars.
For compensation to the messenger in said office, seven hundred dollars, in full of all allowances.
For the contingent expenses of said office, one thousand eight hundred dollars.
For allowance to the superintendent and four watch men, employed for the security of the War and Navy buildings, and for the incidental and contingent expenses including oil, fuel, and candles, two thousand and one hundred and fifty dollars.
For compensation to the Postmaster General, four thousand dollars.
For compensation to two Assistant Postmasters General, five thousand dollars.
For compensation to the clerks in the General Post Office, per act of twentieth April, one thousand eight hundred and eighteen, twenty two thousand seven hundred dollars.

For compensation of thirteen members of the Legislative Council of the territory of Florida, estimating twenty-eight days, at three dollars per day, each, one thousand one hundred and seventy dollars.
For contingent expenses of the Legislative Council, including travelling expenses of the members, and printing the laws of said territory, two thousand dollars.
For the contingent expenses of the Florida territory, three hundred and fifty dollars.
For compensation to the Chief Justice, the Associate Judges, and District Judges of the United States, including the Chief Justice and Associate Judges of the District of Columbia, seventy-nine thousand two hundred dollars.
For compensation to the Attorney General of the United States, three thousand five hundred dollars.
For compensation to the clerk in the office of the Attorney General, eight hundred dollars.
For compensation to the Reporter of the decisions of the Supreme Court, one thousand dollars.
For compensation to sundry District Attorneys and Marshals, as granted by law, including those in the several territories, ten thousand five hundred dollars.
For defraying the expenses of the Supreme, Circuit, and District Courts of the United States, including the District of Columbia, and of jurors and witnesses, in aid of the funds arising from fines, penalties, and forfeitures, and for defraying the expenses of prosecutions for offences against the United States, and for the safe keeping of prisoners, two hundred thousand dollars.
For the payment of sundry pensions granted by the late and present Governments, two thousand and fifty dollars.
For the support and maintenance of light houses, beacons, buoys, and stakes, including the purchase of oil, keepers' salaries, repairs and improvements, and contingent expenses, one hundred and seventeen thousand four hundred and eighty-five dollars and eighty five cents.
For procuring and placing three buoys on the bar near the port of Georgetown, South Carolina, being the amount of an appropriation for that object, carried to the surplus fund on the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, three hundred dollars.
For building a light house on Baker's Island, near Mount Desert, in the state of Maine, in addition to the appropriation of two thousand five hundred dollars, made on the third of March, one thousand eight hundred and twenty three, one thousand three hundred dollars.
For placing a buoy at the mouth of Scuppernon river, in North-Carolina in addition to the appropriation of forty dollars, made on the twenty-sixth of May, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, one hundred and forty dollars.
For placing a buoy at the entrance of Beaufort, in North-Carolina, eight hundred dollars.
For the payment of balances due to officers of the old internal revenue and direct tax, being the amount carried to the surplus fund on the thirty-first of December, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, eight thousand and forty cents.
For the Public Buildings in Washington City, for the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-five, eighty thousand dollars.
For repairs made to the fire engine and hose, for the use of the Public Buildings, and for keeping the same in repair, one hundred and ten dollars.
For improving the Capitol Square, one thousand dollars.
For paving the footway in front of the public grounds on the south side of the Pennsylvania Avenue, between the Capitol and the Navy Office, and for placing stone steps at the several entrances of the Navy Office, six thousand one hundred and sixty-one dollars and ninety-seven cents.
For levelling, graduating, and improving the President's Square, five thousand dollars.
For stationery and books, for the offices of Commissioners of Loans, one thousand five hundred dollars.
For bringing to the Seat of Government the votes for President and Vice President of the United States, three thousand three hundred dollars.
For the discharge of such miscellaneous claims against the United States, not otherwise provided for, as shall be ascertained and admitted in due course of settlement at the Treasury, six thousand dollars.
For surveying the Public Lands of the United States, including the services of three commissioners and a surveyor, appointed to value the lands, between Roberts and Ludlow's lines, in the State of Ohio, one hundred and fourteen thousand nine hundred and eighty-two dollars and sixty cents.
For the salaries of the Registers and Receivers of Land Offices, forty-two thousand dollars.
For the salaries of the Ministers at London, Paris, St. Petersburg, and Madrid, and of the Charge des Affaires at Stockholm, in the Netherlands, and at Lisbon, forty-nine thousand five hundred dollars.
For outfits of Ministers to London and Madrid, and for Charge des Affaires at Lisbon and Paris, twenty-seven thousand dollars.
For the salaries to Ministers, or Charge des Affaires, who have been, or may be, appointed to the governments on the American continent, to wit: Columbia, nine thousand dollars; Chili, nine thousand dollars; Mexico, nine thousand dollars; Buenos Ayres, four thousand five hundred dollars; Guatemala, four thousand five hundred dollars; and Brazil, four thousand five hundred dollars, in all, forty thousand five hundred dollars.
For outfits of a Minister to Mexico, and to Charge des Affaires at Guatemala, Buenos Ayres, and Brazil, twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars.
For the salaries of the Secretaries of Legation, four thousand dollars.
For the contingent expenses of all the Missions abroad, twenty thousand dollars.
For the salaries of Agents of Claims at Paris and London, four thousand dollars.
For the contingent expenses of Foreign Intercourse, forty thousand dollars.
For the relief and protection of distressed American seamen in foreign countries, thirty-five thousand dollars.
For the expenses of Intercourse with the Barbary Powers, thirty thousand dollars.
For the salaries of the Commissioner and Arbitrator under the first article of the Treaty of Ghent, one-half the salary of the Secretary, and half the contingent expenses of the Commission, twelve thousand dollars.
For expenses of carrying into effect the sixth and seventh articles of the Treaty of Ghent, including the compensation of the Commissioner, Agent, and Surveyor, and their contingent expenses, sixteen thousand dollars.
Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That the several sums hereby appropriated shall be paid out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated: Provided, however, That no money appropriated by this act, shall be paid to any person for his compensation, who is in arrears to the United States, until such person shall have accounted for, and paid into the Treasury, all sums for which he may be liable: Provided, also, That nothing in this section contained shall be construed to extend to balances arising solely from the depreciation of Treasury notes received by such person to be expended in the public service; but, in all cases where the pay or salary of any person is withheld, in pursuance of this act, it shall be the duty of the accounting officer, if demanded by the party, his Agent, or Attorney, to report forthwith to the Agent of the Treasury Department, the balance due; and it shall be the duty of the said Agent, within sixty days thereafter, to order suit to be commenced against such delinquent and his sureties.
Sec. 3. And be it further enacted, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and required to pay, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, the sum or sums of money, to which any person, or the legal representatives of any person, may be entitled, by virtue of the act authorizing re-payment for lands erroneously sold by the United States, approved the twelfth day of January, in the year eighteen hundred and twenty-five, upon such person, or his or her legal representatives, complying with the requisitions of that act.
Approved, Feb. 25, 1825.

The Commissioners of the Navy will receive Sealed Proposals, until 3 o'clock, P. M. of the 31st May next, for the following Live Oak Timber, viz:
For one complete frame, to be cut to moulds, for a sloop of war, and for 500 cubic feet of promiscuous timber; to be delivered at the Navy-Yard, near Portsmouth, N. H.
For two complete frames, to be cut to moulds, for sloops of war, and 8500 cubic feet of promiscuous timber; to be delivered at the Navy-Yard, Charleston, S. C.
For one complete frame, cut to moulds, for a sloop of war, and 8500 cubic feet of promiscuous timber; to be delivered at the Navy-Yard, Brooksign, M. F.
For one complete frame, cut to moulds, for a sloop of war, and for 500 cubic feet of promiscuous timber; to be delivered at the Navy-Yard, Philadelphia.
For one complete frame, cut to moulds, for a sloop of war, and 500 cubic feet of promiscuous timber; to be delivered at the Navy-Yard, Gosport, Va.
The promiscuous timber to be at least 12 feet long, sided straight from 11 to 14 inches, round squared, the mauling way, and to curve from 2 inches to 22 inches for every ten feet of its length.
The whole to be delivered at the respective Navy-Yards, on or before the first day of December next, subject to the inspection, measurement, and approval of the respective Commanding Officers of the Yards, or of such other persons as the Commissioners of the Navy may appoint.
Separate proposals must be made for the quantity to be delivered at each of the Yards, which any person may be disposed to supply.

NAVY COMMISSIONERS' OFFICE, 18th February, 1825.
The Commissioners of the Navy will receive sealed proposals until three o'clock P. M. of the 15th day of April next, for supplying the following Timber, viz:
All the Pine Timber necessary for lower masts, bowsprits, to masts, lower yards, and top-ail yards, for three ships of the line; for 3 frigates of the largest class; for 3 frigates of the smaller class; for three sloops of war; and for three lower masts for schooners. For thirty thousand cubic feet of squared Pine Plank Stocks, to be not less than thirty-five feet, and to average forty-five feet in length, of at least eleven inches in diameter, and of equal size at top and butt. One set of the masts and spars for the different classes of vessels, and ten thousand cubic feet of the Plank Stocks, to be delivered at each of the Navy Yards at Charlestown, Mass., Brooklyn, N. York, and Gosport, Va.
For two sets of Pine Beams for Frigates of the largest class; one set to be delivered at the Navy Yard at Charlestown, Mass. and one set at Gosport, Va.
For two sets of Pine Beams for Frigates of the smaller class; one set to be delivered at the Navy Yard at Washington, and one set at the Navy Yard at Gosport, Va.
For fourteen Live Oak Beams for a Ship of the Line, and eight Live Oak Beams for a Frigate of the largest class, eleven pine pieces for masts and spars, and nine pine beams for a ship of the Line, and twenty-two pine pieces for masts and spars for a Frigate of the largest class, to be delivered at the Navy Yard at Gosport, Va.; and for five Live Oak Beams, for a Frigate of the largest class; and 51 pine pieces for masts and spars for a ship, to be delivered at the Navy Yard at Brooklyn, N. York.
The whole of the Pine timber must be of the best long leaf, fine grained, Southern yellow pine—and all the timber must be free from sap, wanes, bad knots, or defects of any kind, and subject to the inspection and approval of the Commandants of the several Yards, or such other persons as the Commissioners of the Navy may appoint for that purpose.
The proposals must state the prices asked per cubic foot; and must be made separately for the masts of each class of vessels, at each place. Persons wishing to contract, may obtain schedules of the pieces required, for masts, spars, and beams, with their several forms and dimensions, by applying in writing or otherwise to the Commissioners, or to the Navy Agents at Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Norfolk, Va. or Charlestown, S. C.
The Pine Beams and Plank Stock, and the Mast and Spar Timber, must be delivered on or before the first day of May, 1826; and the Live Oak Beams, on or before the first November next.
All the Timber, except the Live Oak, must be felled, or must have been felled between the first November and the first March.
