### TYING OF THE CAROTID ARTERY, AND TAKING OUT HALF THE UNDER JAW By Professor Bachelder, of the Berk. Medical Institution.

This was one of the most formidable  
and interesting operations which has  
been performed by any surgeon in the  
United States. The patient was Spencer  
Hubbard, a robust, athletic, labor-  
ing man, forty years of age, a resident  
of Deerfield, Massachusetts. About  
five weeks before the operation, he per-  
ceived a small, unmovable, bony sort  
of a tumor, about equidistant from the  
chin and angle of the lower jaw, which  
was supposed to proceed from some af-  
fection of the teeth. The rapidity of  
its growth from the time it was first dis-  
covered, induced the patient to consult  
Dr. Stephen W. Williams, an eminent  
surgeon, in that vicinity, who at once  
discovered the true nature of the dis-  
ease, and although he resorted to every  
possible measure to disperse it, his  
only hope of relieving Mr. Hubbard  
was by an operation. Thus, in the  
short space of five weeks, from a small  
tubercle, on the outside of the jaw,  
just under the integuments, it increas-  
ed to an alarming size, involved the  
jaw bone, for two inches in length, pro-  
truding into the mouth upon one side,  
distending the cheek and distorting the  
countenance on the other. The teeth  
became loose, and a discharge com-  
menced from the body of the tumor cor-  
roding and extremely fetid. Dr. Will-  
iams now advised an operation, but  
being himself in ill health, despatched  
a messenger to Pittsfield for Professor  
Bachelder.

On Thursday, June 16, all the prin-  
cipal physicians in the county were as-  
sembled at the patient's house, and in  
a general consultation, not only agreed  
unanimously, that an operation was ne-  
cessary, but that it was also advisable  
to pass a ligature round the carotid ar-  
tery. The house being small and a  
great number of professional persons  
and students having come together,  
who were particularly anxious to have  
a full view of the operation, a bower  
was erected on a green, across the way,  
where the patient was placed upon the  
table, and fanned by gentle and refresh-  
ing breezes, during the whole time. It  
is scarcely necessary to make any re-  
marks upon this part, or preparatory  
operation; it is sufficient to say, that  
with the loss of little blood, the right  
carotid artery was drawn up from be-  
tween the muscles, expeditiously, and  
with little pain to the patient, tied with  
a strong ligature. The wound being  
neatly closed with adhesive straps, Mr.  
Hubbard walked back to the house.  
During the night, he had but little pain;  
slept some, and had a good pulse. The  
next day, at 12 o'clock, June 17, the  
faculty having assembled, and the pa-  
tient again placed upon the table, the  
operator made an incision from the an-  
gle of the mouth, to the lobe of the ear,  
and another, vertically, from the cen-  
tre of the under lip, down to the ponum  
adam. By a delicate dissection, in  
which the professor exhibited his thor-  
ough acquaintance with surgical ana-  
tomy, the tumor was exposed. There  
were not more than two gills of blood  
lost, through the whole operation, and  
this may be imputed to the excellent  
precaution of securing the carotid on  
the preceding day.

By one of Hey's saws, the jaw was  
then taken off, at the angle and at the  
right mental foramen; by which means,  
about two inches in length of the jaw  
bone, surrounded by the tumor, was  
readily extracted. The tumor, upon  
examination, proved to be of a cartila-  
ginous consistence; approximates to  
bone.

### OURANG-OUTANG.

An Ourang Outang, or Wild Man of  
the Woods, was brought from Batavia  
to Boston, in the ship Octavia, Capt.  
Blanchard, but he died on the first  
night after his arrival. The following  
is an account of this singular animal,  
after dissection, by Dr. Jeffries:

"This animal is a native of Borneo,  
an Asiatic island under the equator, in  
longitude from 110 to 120 East. In  
his external appearance he resembled  
an African, with the neck somewhat  
shorter, and the head projecting more  
forward. He was three feet and a half  
in height. He was covered with hair  
except his face, the palms of the hands  
and feet, which were all of the color of  
the negro. The hair was of the dun  
color, inclining to black. His ears were  
thin, small and handsome, lying close  
upon the head. His eyes were hazel  
colored, bright, and somewhat deep in  
the sockets. His brow was prominent.  
He had very little hair on the brow.  
His nose was flat. His lips were very  
large and thick, more so than those of  
any negro I ever saw. His chin was  
broad and projecting, as was likewise  
the upper jaw. His chest was round,  
full and prominent. His shoulders were  
well set back. His scapulae were flat  
and close behind. His waist was small.  
His hips were flat and narrow. His arms  
were very long, the fingers reaching to  
the ancles. His lower extremities were  
short and small, in proportion to the  
rest of the animal. He had the spiral  
lines like human, on the tips of the fin-  
gers, and the lines of palmistry on the  
hands, and also on the lower limbs.

Capt. Blanchard gives the following  
account of his habits and manners.

He was put on board the Octavia un-  
der the care of this gentleman, and had  
a house fitted for him, and was provid-  
ed with poultry and rice sufficient for  
the voyage. Captain Blanchard first  
saw him at Mr. Forrestier's house in  
Batavia.

While sitting at breakfast, he heard  
some one enter a door behind, & found  
a hand placed familiarly on his shoul-  
der; on turning round, he was not a  
little surprised to find a hairy negro  
making such an unceremonious acquain-  
tance.

George, by which name he passed,  
seated himself at table by direction of  
Mr. Forrestier, and after partaking of  
coffee, &c. was dismissed. He kept  
his house on ship board clean, and at  
all times in good order; he cleared it  
out daily of remnants of food, &c. and  
frequently washed it, being provided  
with water and a cloth for the purpose.  
He was very cleanly in his person and  
habits, washing his hands and face regu-  
larly and in the same manner as a  
man. He was docile and obedient,  
fond of play and amusement; but would  
sometimes become so rough, although  
in good temper, as to require correction  
from Capt. Blanchard, on which occa-  
sions he would lie down and cry very  
much in the voice of a child, appearing  
sorry for having given offence. His  
food was rice paddy in general, but  
he would and did eat almost any thing  
prepared for him. The paddy he some-  
times eat with molasses, and sometimes  
without. Tea, coffee, fruit, &c. he was  
fond of, and was in the habit of coming  
to the table at dinner to partake of  
wine; this was, in general, claret.

His mode of sitting was on an elevat-  
ed seat, and not on the floor. He was  
free from some of the peculiar propen-  
sities of monkeys. His bowels were  
in general regular. The directions gi-  
ven by Mr. Forrestier were, in cases  
of sickness, to give him castor-oil. It  
was administered to him once on the  
beginning of the passage, and produced  
full vomiting with effectual relief. He  
sickened a second time on the latter  
part of the voyage, and rejected the  
attempts of the captain and several  
strong men, to get the oil into the stom-  
ach. He continued to fail gradually,  
losing his appetite and strength, until  
he died, much emaciated, soon after  
the ship anchored. Obstruction of the  
bowels was no doubt the cause of his  
death. Capt. Blanchard used to feel  
his pulse at the radial artery, and de-  
scribes it to be like the human. It was  
probably quicker. His mode of walk-  
ing was always erect, unless when tired;  
he would then move or rest on all  
fours."
