Translation of a discourse delivered by the King, before the academy of agriculture, on the anniversary of its institution.

Gentlemen: At the institution of this academy, I remarked, in my address, that agriculture flourished most where a people may rest secure as to the future, under the protection of guaranties.

Twelve years ago, we were dependant on our neighbors for the first necessities of life; we are now able to send supplies wherever a scarcity may prevail.

To conquest there is a limit; the necessity of things, the force of events, and nature itself require it. Let us profit by the lessons which every thing conspires to teach.

Nations are unlike to individuals. These are eager to enjoy whatever dazzles, captivates and enchains them. Nations, on the contrary, perceive ages to pass away, and await the approach of future ones.

A nation studies the legislation of its neighbors, to extract from it what is useful; it should study their agriculture and administration, to profit of their discoveries, and avoid their errors.

Let us take advantage of whatever is useful, and reject what is prejudicial. Let us revert to the past, reflect on the present, and trust in the future with confidence, under the protection of that providence, which has, in so miraculous a manner, watched over one of the most ancient people of Europe.
