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DEFERRED ARTICLES.

Maine.—A survey for a canal route to connect the waters of the Androscoggin and Kennebec rivers through the towns of Gardiner, Winthrop, Monmouth and Leeds has recently been made; and so favorable is its result, that a meeting has been called of all the friends of the proposed canal on the 2d Nov. for the purpose of making the necessary arrangements.

Massachusetts.—In two months the auctioneers of Boston have paid into the State Treasury for duties on sales at auction, about \$5,370.—Boston is said to own about 100 acres of land on the Neck, which is to be laid out for sale in elegant squares, with streets of 50 feet. The Amesbury flannel manufactory consumes daily 4900 lbs. of wool. It is stated that in two Factories at Amesbury Mills, 20,000 pieces of flannel are to be manufactured the ensuing year. The Newburyport Herald says, that these flannels have justly acquired a high reputation in the United States.—There is an establishment in Roxbury, which manufactures colours for staining and painting paper hangings, and printing calicoes, pronounced to be equal, if not superior, to any imported from the workshops of Europe. "They comprise (says the Providence Patriot) almost every color and hue of the rainbow, and for their brilliancy and radiance, surpass any thing we have heretofore seen." They are manufactured from the hoofs, horns, and bones of cattle, and thus supply a demand for an article hitherto comparatively useless.—The Messrs. Ames of Springfield, are said to have the most extensive paper manufactory in the United States; they have 12 engines in operation, and employ more than 100 girls, besides the requisite proportion of men and boys.

Rhode Island.—The General Assembly convened on the 31st October. An election will be directed for the second member of Congress, the choice of one only (Tristram Burgess), being effected at the last election. Mr. Jas. D'Wolf has sent in to the Governor his resignation as Senator of the U. States; and of course the Assembly will have to supply his vacancy.—An extensive Laboratory has been erected on Carpenter's Point, at Providence, under the superintendence of Dr. Parsons: its aqua fortis, oil of vitriol, and other acids, are said to be equal to the imported.

New-York.—A traveller in the N. York Commercial Advertiser states that persons bound to New-Orleans, now the Canal is finished, find but 90 miles land travelling between the town of Erie and Pittsburgh; that he came that charming route, against the streams of the Mississippi and Ohio, to the city of New-York in 24 days; expense about \$90.—The journey through the Canal will be less expensive.

Maryland.—The insolvent law of this state provides, that if upon the allegation of a creditor that a debtor has conveyed away a part of his property, with fraudulent views, and the fact should be established by a jury, the debtor shall be for ever precluded from all benefit of the act. A case of this description was lately decided in the county court of Baltimore, the debtor was found guilty of the fraud; the legal costs incurred by the creditor in the prosecution amounted to more than \$700; and the court decided that no costs could be recovered of the debtor on the trial of such an issue.—The consecration of the Right Rev. B. Fenwick, as Roman Catholic Bishop of Boston, took place on Tuesday in the Cathedral Church of Baltimore: besides the most Rev. Archbishop Mareschal, there were present bishops Conwell of Philadelphia and England of Charleston, and a number of the Rev. Clergy. Bishop England preached on the occasion.

Georgia.—A sample of sugar from Montgomery, Geo. has been shown at Savannah, said to be of as fine quality as the New-Orleans; it is cultivated on the pine land, for domestic consumption. The National Intelligencer lately copied from a Winchester paper an

article speaking confidently (as if from one having authority,) that the Creek affair would be adjusted to the satisfaction of Georgia; and without carrying the matter before Congress. For our own parts, we attached very little credit to the article itself: the last Millidgeville Journal makes the following remarks on it: "The article which we copied last week, relative to the settlement of our differences with the U. States government, in regard to the Creek lands, seems to be understood differently by different persons. We have been under the impression that none of the Indians residing within the limits of Georgia objected to the treaty. When, therefore, it was stated, that Georgia would be content with the land of those Creeks who were knowingly parties to the treaty, we understood the expression to relate to all the Creek lands within the boundary of Georgia. If, however, the fact should be otherwise, if it is intended by the United States government to give up any part of the lands of Georgia, we can say with the utmost confidence that Georgia will never agree to it. Georgia will insist on having the whole of her lands. She has justice and equity on her side, and will adhere to the ground she has taken."

Kentucky.—From Pittsburg to the mouth of the Mississippi, there is a clear navigation for Steamboats (unless in very dry seasons) with the exception of the Falls of Louisville on the Ohio.—But a company has recently been formed, who have advertised proposals to cut a canal to avoid this obstruction. The locks of the canal, for the purpose of passing the largest Steamboats, will be 190 feet long and 50 wide. Attached to the canal will be erected dry docks in similar dimensions, for the convenient repair of vessels navigating those waters. 800 shares of stock in this canal have been taken by a Mercantile House in Portsmouth, N. H. The number of shares not taken does not exceed 50, by the last accounts. The work is expected to commence early in the spring.
