In all countries, when population has reached a certain density, where many persons have collected together, possessing different sentiments and inclinations, it has been found advisable, for the good of the whole, to surrender a certain portion of their privileges; to yield up on the altar of public good, a share of their rights, which forms a reservoir, or general fund of protecting power, to be dealt out as justice or the invasion of those conceded privileges may require, for the safety of individuals and their property. In proportion as the society enlarges, as the association grows, the wants of the community increase—so in a proportionable degree must this protecting power enlarge. New wants create new efforts, and additional efforts result in additional possessions, which must have appropriate security. This is the process by which nations commence their existence and gradually pass all the intermediate periods of existence, from the earliest infancy to old age.

That community is young, and of a tender age, which does not make the cultivation of the intellectual faculties, and the preservation of the health of its citizens, the primary objects of its consideration—that wields the whole of the sacred authority with which a certain number of them are occasionally clothed, in promoting the safety alone of filthy lucre, of a poor pitiable self, while scarcely a resolution is entered into, a dollar expended, towards the improvement of the public mind, or the health of the body.—That community is green, and very remote in the art of governing, that has not done all that human invention can do, to insure long life, secure good health, and enoble the mind—that has not placed within the reach of the rising generation, the most ample means of instruction—that has not thereby availed itself of whatever of intellectual weight, though in a latent state, it might probably be found to possess. For the aggregate mass of intellect is never effectually sounded, until the elementary branches of knowledge are within the power of all, until every mind shall have been in some degree cultivated.

Second only in importance to the improvement of the mind, are the means necessary to the possession of the greatest of all enjoyments, freedom from disease; or, as the liability to disease cannot be totally eradicated from the system, to have diffused throughout the community, the most correct methods of alleviating them—to have within the reach of all, persons, who, from a thorough acquaintance with the great variety of remedies that have been from time to time in use, from an intimate knowledge of their virtues, their influence on the system, in health and in disease, to be abundantly qualified to remove as much of disorder as is possible for medical agents to effect.

There is nothing so important, that has so many outlets, such a multiplicity of avenues to its approach, that is so sacred a trust, that is so reluctantly parted with, and still there is nothing men are so disposed to tamper with, so much abused, so much and so continually put in jeopardy, as life. In its secular concerns, the management of property, where rights are entangled and perplexities arise, the most able advice is invariably resorted to; but here the authorities have guarded against misplaced confidence, for none are allowed to practice the law but such as have, by previous examination, been found competent. But, where life and death are concerned, strange infatuation, the most stupid old woman, the most unlettered African, the most wanton impostor, who knows nothing of the anatomy of the body, of the science of medicine, or if they know anything, know just enough, to make them ten times more dangerous than if they knew nothing at all, are applied to.—But still more strange the infatuation! that men delegated with authority to meet in consultation concerning the general welfare, who are looked up to as the guardians of the people, and who are too, in most cases, selected on account of their superior capability, should have suffered until now, the State of North-Carolina, in other respects so respectable, to be the receptacle, the recipient of the bold current of degradation, where streams of professional dress from other States are allowed to disengage, and spread their poisonous influence.

Is it not evident, that the ailments incident to the human frame are greatly multiplied by these untaught gentry? Simple maladies, that the natural energies of the system itself would have overcome, but for the interference of these pretenders, who, by opposing the curative efforts of nature, the slightest diseases are rendered obstinate, complex, constitutional, and fatal.

Let then the general assemblage of the people's delegates, establish a Board of Scientific Physicians, who have obtained degrees; whose duty it shall be to hold a biennial session in the City of Raleigh, for the purpose of examining and granting licenses to such candidates for the dictate as may apply,

and shall be found in possession of the requisite attainments, and who wish to practice medicine or retail drugs within the limits of the State. Let it be made criminal with fine and imprisonment provided as penalties, to deter all persons from giving medicine, or selling drugs, as a business of profit, without having obtained a licence from the State Board, or without having a degree from some respectable medical college.

Let them, after the example of S. Carolina and other States, that have regarded medicine as a science, make these enactments to operate prospectively, to affect all who hereafter may be candidates for the practice of medicine, and for the vending of drugs; and not those who are the present incumbents of these professions.
