Postage stamps cannot be used in payment of the duty chargeable on instruments.

It is the duty of the maker of an instrument to affix and cancel the stamp thereon. If he neglects to do so, the party for whose use it is made may stamp it before it is used; but in no case can it be legally used without a stamp; and if used after the 30th of June, 1854, and used without a stamp; it cannot afterwards be effectually stamped. Any failure upon the part of the maker of an instrument to eppropriately stamp it renders him liable to a penalty of two hundred dollars.

The assignment of a mortgage is subject to the same stamp duty as that imposed upon the original instrument; that is to say, for every sum of five hundred deliass, or any fractional part thereof, of the amount secured by the mortgage, at the time of its assignment, there must be affixed a stemp or stamps, denoting a duty of fifty cents. When two or more persons join in the execution of an instrument, the stamps to which the instrument is liable under the law, may be affixed and cancelled by one of the parties.

In conveyances of real estate, the law provides that the stamp affixed must answer to the value of the estate or interest conveyed.
