Excursions and Pic-nics.
 The expansive bosom of New
 York bay and the blue waters of
 the Hudson and East Rivers were
 yesterday swarming with crafts of
 every tannage and description,
 bearing their festive and frolic-
 some throngs to the various pla-
 ces of resort for pleasure-seekers
 which so thickly stud the envi-
 rons of the Empire City. Papa
 and mamma made a field-day of
 it, and the amount of lager beer
 and other cooling drinks consumed
 by families in search of recreation
 and shade was something fearful
 to compute or even approach in
 calculation.
 The lovers and sentimental peo-
 ple desiring unobtrusive seclusion
 and privacy, went to fort Lee;
 those in want of clams and heated
 feet, to Coney Island; piscatorial
 parties to the fishing banks; pri-
 vate parties to the shady shore of
 Staten Island, or other neighbor-
 ing and familiar retreats; the
 Teutonic and fun-enjoying ele-
 ment to Lion's Park, Conrad's
 Park, and Broadway Park, and
 the hard-worked and much
 abused histrionic people to Belle-
 vue Gardens, bordering East
 River. West Point and other pla-
 ces of historic interest on the
 North River, also received their
 contributions of excursionists and
 pleasure-seekers.

The lager beer gardens situate
 in the Rhenish town of Hoboken
 —for Hoboken is as distinctly
 German as if it were overhung by
 some bathing schloss, or fortress
 on the Rhine—were very favora-
 bly patronized by the large num-
 ber of people who thronged the
 ferry-boats to escape the din and
 noise. Nor should Westhaken or
 the Hotel de Irish be forgotten in
 the generalization of scenes around
 the city. Young gentlemen in
 long-tailed coats, shanghai hats,
 and generally fierce appearing,
 accompanied by young ladies
 wearing scanty draperies and
 jockey hats, danced away the
 heated hours of the day under the
 shade of the grim and granite
 palisades, with slight interruptions
 for lager ice cream or other re-
 freshing beverages.

The steamer Magenta, loaded
 to the gun-wales with happy be-
 lings of both sexes, made an ex-
 cursion down the bay for the pur-
 pose of giving her passengers a
 snuff of old ocean's saline breezes.
 Several hundred people also jour-
 neyed toward Richmond and Nor-
 folk, Virginia, with the intent of
 spending a few days amid the
 scenes made memorable by the
 convulsions of four years civil war.
 Seldom has there been such an
 universal and heart-whole celebra-
 tion of the Anniversary of National
 Independence as New York
 witnessed yesterday, blessed as
 the occasion was by the return of
 of triumphant and ameliorating
 peace.—Times.

 kiss me, why don't they? No-
 body has offered to since I have
 been here." Instantly about a

 He attempted a retreat but in
 vain; he essayed to break through

 Then for the first time he confessed
 himself vanquished, and calmly
 awaited the event. Never was
 such a man subjected to such an
 ordeal. On came the maidens by
 squads, in file, or singly; they hit
 him on the forehead; pelted him
 on the nose; smacked him on the
 cheek, chin or neck. There must
 be dozens of kisses lying around
 loose, hidden in the General's
 whiskers. During this terrible
 ordeal, the hero of a hundred bat-
 tle-fields blushed till his face be-

 "noble rage," he escaped.
