**THE CELEBRATION YESTERDAY.**—The celebra-  
tion by the colored people yesterday, of the  
anniversary of their emancipation, was well got-  
ten up, and attracted a great deal of attention.  
It is worthy of remark that the proceedings  
throughout were of the most orderly and proper  
character—such as to elicit no taunting remarks  
from the multitude of whites everywhere gath-  
ered to witness the procession. After passing  
through the principal streets, led by a band of  
music, the procession entered the large open  
space on Broadstreet, between Middle and Han-  
cock streets, where a stand for speakers had been  
erected. Here they were addressed by J. H.  
LARRIS, a colored orator, in a style that was  
highly creditable to any one. His oration was  
not only well delivered, but was remarkably tem-  
perate, and appropriate. The usual ill-natured  
illusions to the whites found no place in the  
speaker's address, and his advice to his hearers  
was of that kind which, if followed, will gain  
them much honor and many friends among the  
white citizens of the South.

After the exercises in the public square, the  
different leagues, associations and schools  
marched to the places at which they had formed  
in the morning.

**PAINFUL ACCIDENT.**—An officer, whose name is  
given as SMITH S. GILBERT, was badly wounded  
yesterday morning. It appears that he was one  
of the gunners engaged in firing the salute during  
the celebration, and was at the muzzle of his  
piece, which had been discharged five times.  
Either from neglecting to sponge the cannon out,  
or because the man at the vent removed his  
thumb too soon, whilst the cartridge was being  
rammed home, the piece was discharged, and his  
right hand was blown off. He was immediately  
carried to his quarters, where surgical aid was  
summoned. Of course, amputation of the fore-  
arm will be necessary.

**TWO BALLS.**—The new year opened in New  
Bern unusually gay. In addition to the colored  
celebration, and usual routine of fire-crackers, rock-  
ets, firing guns, &c., five balls were given, at  
which we understood were very brilliant affairs.  
It matters not if the poor do starve—no business  
will be poor.

**A NEGRO MAN SHOTS HIS WIFE.**—Yesterday  
morning an altercation took place between a ne-  
gro man and his wife, at a house in Burnside  
Alley, near the Railroad Depot. The result was,  
he shot her through the cheeks with a pistol. No  
arrest made that we heard of. The wound,  
though painful, is not considered dangerous.

**President Johnson's First Leavee.**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—Notwithstanding the  
disagreeable condition of the weather, the first  
leavee of President Johnson was largely at-  
tended. The Foreign Ministers, Members of the  
Cabinet, and other prominent civil officers, to-  
gether with the Senators and Representatives,  
were received first, after which officers of the  
army, navy and marine corps, followed by citi-  
zens, and paid their respects. Gen. Grant and  
staff were present, and conspicuous among the  
crowd. The Marine Band discoursed pleasant  
music.

After the general reception at the Executive  
Mansion, the officers of the army and navy  
on the ground were admitted, and paid their res-  
pects to the President.

The public departments are closed, and busi-  
ness are nearly generally suspended.

**PROCLAMATION**  
By W. W. HOLDEN, Provisional Governor  
of North Carolina.

WHEREAS, It was provided by the Convention of the  
people of North Carolina, recently in session, that  
the Ordinance passed by that body, entitled, "An Ordi-  
nance declaring null and void the Ordinance of May 20th,  
1861," and the Ordinance entitled, "An Ordinance pro-  
hibiting slavery in North Carolina," should be submitted  
to the qualified voters of the State for ratification or  
rejection;  
And Whereas, on the ninth day of November, one  
thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, the aforesaid  
Ordinances were submitted to the qualified voters,  
as provided by said Convention;  
And the Sherrifs of the respective counties (with the  
exception of Franklin, Moore, and Yadkin) having made  
due returns to me of the results of the polls in their  
counties, as hereinafter set forth in the table appended  
to this Proclamation:  
Now, therefore, I, W. W. HOLDEN, Provisional Govern-  
or of the State of North Carolina, do hereby proclaim  
and declare that on the said ninth day of November, one  
thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, there were nine-  
teen thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven votes  
cast to ratify the "Ordinance declaring null and void the  
Ordinance of May 20th, 1861," and one thousand nine  
hundred and forty votes cast to reject said Ordinance;  
and eighteen thousand five hundred and twenty-seven  
votes were cast to ratify the "Ordinance prohibiting  
slavery in North Carolina," and three thousand six  
hundred and ninety-six votes cast to reject said  
Ordinance.  
And I furthermore proclaim and declare, in accordance  
with an Ordinance of the said Convention, entitled "An  
Ordinance submitting to the qualified voters of the State  
the ratification or rejection of certain Ordinances," that  
the said Ordinances, having been ratified by a majority of  
the qualified voters of the State, are of binding force and  
effect, as "laws of the land," and that the "Ordinance  
prohibiting slavery in North Carolina," has become a part  
of the Constitution of said State.  
Done at our city of Raleigh, this 26th day of  
December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five,  
and in the year of the Independence of the United States  
the nineteenth.
