**MR. GIBBERT'S WOUND.**—We have learned from a gentleman, who was present at the time Mr. GIBBERT was wounded by the premature discharge of a six-pounder, on Monday, that the forearm has been amputated about four inches below the elbow, and that he is doing well.

From an eye-witness of the affair, we have obtained the full particulars. It seems that the piece was one of the old 1821, smooth-bore brass kind, considerably honey-combed. Some thirteen rounds had been fired, and Capt. JOHN E. McVION, our worthy and popular Provost Marshal, was tumbling the vent. The piece had not been sponged, from the time the twelfth round was fired, and the debris of powder had become caked and was on fire. The charge which occasioned the accident had not gone in more than two feet, when the powder became ignited from the fire in the gun. Capt. McVion's hand was blown from the vent with such force as to render his right hand useless for several days, such was the force of the powder through the vent of the gun. His right thumb was badly sprained, and the thick thumb-stall completely burned. Thus it will be seen that the unfortunate occurrence is attributable to the gun's not being sponged after each discharge.

If the elements are in sorrow for the sins of our country, and take the present opportunity to get rid of superfluous tears, in the way of penitence, we have no objection. But in the language of Solicitor FRICK, when pleading a case in Mayor's Court, "we humbly submit" to the clerk of the weather, that the grief is becoming a little too watery. The promise of a dry day and bright, fair weather, would go far toward dispelling the impression that light draft boats will have to be procured pretty soon for the purpose of navigating the streets of the city. It is stated that a colored fair one, in attempting the passage yesterday from the corner of one block to the corner of another, disappeared almost entirely in the mud and water. An energetic philanthropist, passing over the same route shortly afterward, discovered a combination head ornament of the horse-hair style of architecture floating around in animated style, and stooping down, grasped it, when he heard a voice beneath, *slightly* broken by bubbles of mud and water, exclaim, "Let loose dat, you white man! dat's my waterfall!" She was rescued, but in a sad plight. When she went in she looked full and plump as a Polyglot Bible; when she was drawn out she resembled the collapsed condition of an elementary spelling book, with all the leaves torn out. Waterfalls are good things in their way, but there is a little more waterfalling than is absolutely necessary to comfort just now.

**PIZZARRO.**—We respectfully suggest to the management, the manifest impropriety of attempting such pieces as *Pizzarro*, until the promised creations of the scenic artist assume some tangible form. Mr. DAVIS is very good, so is Miss DILLINGHAM. Mr. ROGERS is always good, and Mrs. PAUL is rapidly improving in the effort to acquire self-confidence. But the noble army of Peruvians and the ditto of Spaniards are woefully lacking. The royal Peruvian wander about like a king without subjects, and suggests the idea that shabbiness is a prominent feature of his regal getting up. But the people of New Berne are determined to be pleased with everything, and we will not attempt an interference with so amiable a disposition.

Mr. ROGERS will meet his friends and the public to-night as a beneficiary, and, as his efforts are all for the public good, we know that the public will do the right thing for him.

To-morrow evening Madame CARLOTTA POZZONI, the famed lyric artist, will make her first appearance in the musical piece, "Child of the Regiment." Her presence on our boards will settle the question whether or not we have a refined taste in our community for true art. We remember, some seven or eight years ago, Mme. P. was a great favorite with the people of Mobile and New Orleans. In the former city she was the guest of the distinguished Madame LeVER, a known patroness of music and the fine arts. Madame P. is a warm-hearted woman of soul, and she knows how to infuse her feelings into her music.

**ARRESTED.**—U. S. Deputy Marshal KEROE went on board the steamer *Lucy*, Monday night, and arrested, by virtue of a U. S. warrant, one of the firemen of the steamer, for a murderous assault upon the cook. The old man (a negro) was badly cut over the left eye, by a hammer in the hands of the fireman. His wound, a very ugly laceration, was dressed at Dr. MENNINGER'S drug store, and he was directed to keep his bed for a while.

The colored man who shot his wife, Monday morning, has been arrested. He denied the shooting, and said he had no fire-arms about the house. A search of the premises, however, brought to light a rifle and a shot gun. The revolver which he had used upon the person of his wife, was found also, in the water closet, where, it is supposed, he threw it after the shooting.

**THE PAYMENT OF BANK SUBSCRIPTIONS.**—We are pleased to learn that subscribers to the stock of the National Bank are now paying up their respective portions of the first instalment. From the notice published in another column, it is expected the entire amount of the first instalment will be paid in by Friday of this week. This will enable the necessary bonds to be purchased and filed, and the requisite certificate of authority obtained, preparatory to opening the bank for business.

Every day demonstrates the great want of a regular National Bank among business men and depositors. There is every reason to believe that the stock of the bank in question will soon become highly valuable and an object to be sought after. It is generally believed among intelligent men that a more favorable point for the establishment of a National Bank cannot be found in the South than at New Berne.

**THE TOWN MEETING.**—The town meeting, called by his Honor, Mayor HOUCH, was very largely attended last night by the citizens of our town. Indeed it was a full-grown mass meeting. A number of speeches were made, and several resolutions passed, among which was one requesting the Mayor to issue his proclamation appointing an election for Mayor and Commissioners, under the late address of Gov. WORTH.

Our reporter was not in time to get a collected statement of the proceedings, and besides, the meeting held too late for a full account in this issue. To-morrow we will give proceedings in full.

**THE GRAND BALL and Supper** given by the Board of Officers of the Fire Department on Monday night, was everything which the lover of those social gatherings could desire. The attendance was very full, and the hall was brilliant with the show uniforms of the different organizations, and the elegant apparel of the fair. Among those present were Col. W. W. WHEELER, the popular commandant of this District, and his Honor Mayor HOUCH. The dancing continued until 5 o'clock, yesterday morning, broken only by the call of Capt. REED to the elegant and bountiful supper which he had provided for the festive throng. The citizens of New Berne will long remember with pleasure the New Year's Ball of 1866.

**BURIED IN A WELL.**—A man named Christian Arut was recently buried alive in a well on the farm of George Harmon, in Bainbridge, Mich. He was being lowered into the well by a windlass, for the purpose of examining the curbing, which was somewhat decayed. When at the depth of forty feet (the well is seventy feet deep), he called to those above to draw him up, as the curbing was giving away beneath him. They began to raise him up, and almost immediately a part of the curbing above him caved in, filling the tub and taking it down with such force as to break one arm of the windlass. The other arm caught in the clothing of a boy working it, and threw him clear over the shaft, several feet away. The whole well finally caved in from the very top. The whole neighborhood was aroused, and every effort was being made to recover the body of the unfortunate man, but without success.

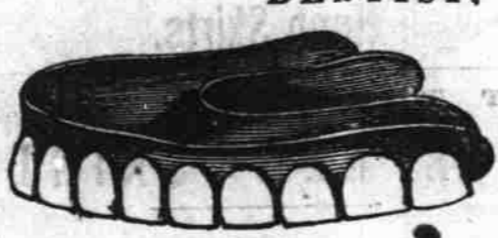
