BUMMING WITH A VENGEANCE.—A gentleman of intelligence and reliability was in our office yesterday, from the upper part of the county, who informed us that bands of armed, lawless negroes are prowling through the country, in the neighborhood of Bachelors' Creek and Tuscarora, stealing and robbing at a high hand. During Christmas week, they swept Mr. WILEY AVERY'S farm of pretty nearly everything that they could carry off. At a later date they made a descent upon Mrs. STEVENSON'S premises, and gutted her smoke-house, carrying off every pound of meat she had.

Our informant assures us that no less than four highway robberies have been committed in broad day light on the public road, leading to Tuscarora, within the last twenty days.

Now this ought not to be, and under proper management, would not be. If we had civil law fully established, outlaws would have to stand from under.

A great many persons imagine that the freedmen, if left without federal protection, would be oppressed and greatly abused. We don't believe a word of it. They would be made to respect themselves and the law, and it would be better for them. White men, if left without law or restraint, would be as bad as negroes. Law is necessary for all, and should be enforced.

DELIGHTFUL.—Yesterday was as delightful a day as one could wish for in January. There was very little wind, and not a cloud to obscure the sun, while the streets were dry and pleasant. In our business office, which unfortunately we have no means of warming, the mercury at day break, the hour we always enter it, if not earlier, stood at 32 deg. At 12 M. it had risen to 44 deg., and the temperature was considered by all as exceedingly salubrious.

The steamer *Jupiter*, of the Peoples Line, started from this port, on Tuesday afternoon, in her regular trip, and on reaching Long Shoal Light, about 27 miles from Roanoke Island, she encountered fields of solid ice, through which she plunged. After proceeding about five miles or so, and finding the ice more solid, it was deemed prudent to return, as a passage through the Roanoke marshes was impossible. She reports having passed the steamer *El Cid*, riding at anchor, off North West Point, waiting an opportunity to proceed to sea.

XXXIX Congress.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10, 1866.

SENATE.—Senator Wilson introduced a bill fixing the peace establishment of the army. It provides seven regiments of artillery, ten regiments of cavalry, and sixty regiments of infantry, each branch to have a proportionate number of black troops, officered by whites. Senator Howe offered a resolution declaring that the seceded States had forfeited their rights, and made a speech denying the doctrine of the indestructibility of State governments; he said the President had no right to restore the rebel States; his duties were only executive.

HOUSE.—Wilson, of Iowa, made a speech in support of the bill extending the suffrage in the District of Columbia; he said the social element here fostered secession. He made a lengthy speech on the business. Boyer, of Pennsylvania, opposed the bill on the ground that this is a white man's government; he said the intention of the bill was to effect the equality of races. S. Hofield, of Pennsylvania, was in favor of the bill.

SENATE.—In response to the Senate resolution asking why Jefferson Davis has not yet been tried, the President to-day transmitted his message, enclosing a letter from Attorney-General Speed, who states that no Circuit Courts have been held in the late rebellious districts since the termination of hostilities, and holds the opinion that the late insurgents awaiting trial should be tried only before Civil Courts, when peace is fully and actually restored, and has not thought proper to advise the President to cause legitimate proceedings to be instituted against Mr. Davis or any other insurgents, in States or districts in which they were not fully present during the prosecution of hostilities.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.
Voluminous papers, relative to the Confederate emigration to Mexico, and the plan of Mairy and Gwin, were presented in the Senate to-day.

Letters from Mr. Romero, showing an understanding between the traitors in Mexico and the insurgents in the United States, are produced.

From Maryland.

BALTIMORE, Jan. 10, 1866.
The Maryland Legislature met to-day. Governor Swan, elected a year ago, under the new Constitution, took his seat.

HON. KENNETH RAYNER.—The Raleigh Standard says:

We are gratified to have it in our power to state that our distinguished fellow-citizen, Hon. Kenneth Rayner, who has been confined for some time by sickness, is now convalescent, and rapidly recovering his strength. Mr. Rayner will be sufficiently restored to resume his seat in the Commons on the 18th, in which body he cannot fail, from his great experience and ability as a statesman, to take a leading part.

OUT IN THE COOL.—On Saturday night some of the police picked up a little darkey in the street, in about the same condition, as to wearing apparel, that Adam and Eve was in prior to their manufacture of garments from fig leaves. The pickaninny was taken to the guard-house and kept warm until Sunday morning, when he was transferred to the guardianship of the Freedmen's Bureau (probably under the idea that there might be found something in some of the drawers of his benefit.) His sister with whom he lived, appeared before the Bureau to claim him, stating that on Saturday night she had intended to give him a little sisterly correction for some of his infantile errors, and had stripped him for that purpose; but just at this critical juncture her attention was called to some other business, when young Africa not liking the aspect of affairs in esse et in potentia, slipped out at the door and took to his heels, and was arrested in his wild career by the police, as above stated. His affectionate relative took him home, to finish, perhaps, the uncompleted lessons of Saturday evening.

The Raleigh Progress, of the 8th, says:

"BOLD ROBBERY.—GREAT HAUL OF GOLD.—THE ROGUES AT LARGE.—The most daring and successful robbery of the season was brought to light yesterday morning, involving a heavy loss to two of our merchants. It appears that during Saturday night, some unknown parties succeeded in effecting an entrance into the store of D. C. Murray, near side of Fayetteville, between Morgan and Hargett streets. The parties engaged in the exploit approached the store in the rear and finding their way clear, first proceeded to raise an angar in boring the window blind. This part of the performance gone through with, they easily forced the fastenings and hoisting the sash, entered the premises. Lust of filthy lucre prompted the midnight prowlers to search the money-locker before appropriating Mr. M.'s wares. Unfortunately for our merchant neighbor, he had been paid a heavy amount of coin the afternoon preceding the robbery, which he carefully put up in a package and unfortunately left in the drawer. Securing this prize, no wonder the rogues quitted the house without taking any article of merchandise—such riches were enough to satiate the appetite of a prince. But imagine the surprise of the house-breakers, if you can, when, after so much labor, to find on opening their spoils that they had secured, instead of gold, two hundred copper cents!

So far Mr. Murray has not been able to discover any other lossage. It is the best joke of the times—the biter has been bit—and we congratulate both parties on the result. Owing to the paper covering and their greed of gain, the desperadoes failed most signally of their object.

STATE LIBRARIAN.—It is said that Governor Worth has appointed Mr. O. H. Perry to the position of State Librarian. He was displaced some time since by reason of uniting his duties with those of keeper of the capitol.

HIGH WATER.—It is said the high water in Roanoke river, another product of late rains, prevented the Petersburg from connecting with the Raleigh and Gaston trains last Saturday.

CAVALRY FOR NORTH CAROLINA.—Four companies of the Fifth United States cavalry, serving in the vicinity of Cumberland, Md., have been ordered to report to the commanding officer in North Carolina for assignment to duty.

Capt. Hinton, Charlotte. The military post of Greensboro is discontinued. Capt. Barnett, of Co. B, is detailed in the Freedmen's Bureau, at Charlotte.

Rev. Thos. E. SKINNER has resigned the pastoral charge of the Baptist church in Raleigh.

FAYETTEVILLE.—The election for Mayor and Commissioners of this town, last week, resulted in favor of the old board by a considerable majority.
