The "Great Detective" Hors de Combat-

Spy Upon the President.
[Special Dispatch to the Richmond Times.] Washington, Jan. 16.—The notorious Government Detective, General L. C. Baker, ceases to be a Brigadier General with this day. By the terms of an order from the War Department, his commission was cancelled on the 15th instant, and he is mustered out of the service." It should be borne in mind, however, that the mili-tary officers here disclaim Baker's right to recognition of the military service, proper, since he did not receive his title of Brigadier General by reason of mentorious conduct in the field, nor on account of service in the army of the United States. His "promotion" to a Brigadiership was the work of Mr. Stanton, upon importunities of Baker, who asked the distinction as a sort of healthy covering to hide his disreputable conduct whilst acting in the capacity of chief-thief-catch er, etc., for the government. This detective has had his day; now his trouble will commence, for he can no longer, at his own bidding, bring to his aid the strong arm of the Gov ernment to protect him from the vengeance of outraged citizens who have been the sufferers in person and property from the unconstitutional and utterly illegal acts of this man.

Baker had become so impudent, and felt so entirely secure from the reach of all men, save the Secretary of War, that he actually attempted to play the Detective upon the President and his household, some weeks ago. There is scarcely a doubt, however, that this last specimen of indecency and wonderful impudence was encouraged, if not suggested, by some of the President's "Radical friends." The "Great Detective" made an utter failure of his espionage upon the Executive mansion, for it was somehow discovered by Mr. Johnson, who sent a messenger to bring Baker immediately into his presence. The Detective dropped every other consideration and repaired with all haste to the White House, totally at fault as to the purpose of this summons from the President. His name being announced. the President directed that he be at once admitted, notwithstanding the presence of several gentlemen then engaged with Mr. Johnson. The latter then most unceremoniously charged Baker with his villainous espionage, and informed him that if he again heard of his presence in or prowling about the White House, or if he permitted any of his creatures to sneak around the premises, the "Great Detective" should himself lodge in some of the dingy cells in the Old Capitol, where so many had been incarcerated upon the simple order of Baker himself, without warrant or the semblance of law or justice.

### Exciting News From Ireland-Other Foreign Items.

[From the New York News, 13th.] There was a report a few days since in this city that a collision had occurred between a body of Fenians in Ireland and a detachment of British troops and constabulary. The statement, conveyed through some mysterious channel, was not generally credited; but it created intense excitement in Fenian circles, and the further announcement that the British had been defeated was received with rapture, as an augury of future tri-umph for the cause of Irish freedom. We supposed at the time that the friends of that cause ere building a hope too freely upon the founda-op of a vague rumon but the news brought by the section implies that that rumon may but have pointed to the shadow of coming events. It is evident that something has occurred to disturb the repose of the British lion, and possibly the soil of the Green Isle may soon be dedicated to a med revolution by bloodshed in the first battle

of the Fenian war. It is a matter of doubt whether all these preparations were caused by actual danger or mere exaggerated apprehension of the British

## A Coptic Papyrus Deciphered.

At a recent meeting of the Royal Society of Literature, in London, a Coptic papyrus in the possession of Mr. Henry Vaughan was exhibited by Rev. Dunbar Heath. Mr. Goodwin, previous to his departure from England for Shanghae, dedocument is of the eighth century. A woman

named Callisthene gives away her child, aged five years, in the following terms:—
"I grant my beloved son, Mercury, unto the holy monastery of the holy father Phæbamon, of Mount Djeme, that he may be a slave thereto, in its watering, and drawing, and everything en-joined upon the inhabitants of the holy monastery, so that the holy monastery may be his owner forever, and of the labor of his hands, and the hire of his body, whether he be in the mo-nastery or whether he be out of themonastery, according to the command of the superior; and it shall not be lawful for me, nor for any man of mine, nor any man whatsoever who may be of my town, whether great or little, nor to those who rule, or those who shall hereafter rule over us, to bring any action against the holy monastery on account of this same child, nor to establish any claim upon him before the rulers or powers, little or great. Let such an one, in the first place, not profit in anything, but may God bring him to his holy tribunal with me, that I may contend with him, and that he may give account at the judgment sent of God for that which he hath done, for that he hath laid hands to violate this vow and this offer which I have vowed unto God; and let him fall under the great curse of the Scripture, which are in the Deuteronomy of Moses, let him see the kingdom of God opened while he is prevented from entering into it. For this security, therefire, I have established this grant, and have signed it as it is written.".

At the back of the papyrus a unique list of the male and female singers in the monastery is given, arranged antiphonally.
