THE CITY MEETING.—The City meeting last night was pretty well attended, and considerable interest was manifested.

At about half past 7 o'clock the meeting was organized by calling Jno. N. WASHINGTON, Esq., to the Chair, and — SPENCER, Esq., to the Secretary's desk.

The Chairman explained the object of the meeting to be, to nominate suitable candidates for Mayor and Councilmen at the approaching municipal election.

Mr. JOHNSON H. BRYAN insisted that its object was merely to nominate a candidate for Mayor. Mr. Z. SLADE thought it entirely competent to nominate Councilmen, as a City meeting could hardly be assembled, without the wards all being represented.

The Chairman said that he did not know the object of the meeting only as he had gotten it from the party who had called it.

Mr. M. PATTERSON then arose and sustained the position of the Chair, and advocated warmly the nomination of the whole Board. He called for the reading of the call in the morning paper, which seemed also to corroborate the position first assumed.

This question being settled, on motion of Mr. M. PATTERSON, the Chair appointed Messrs. S. S. DUFFY, JAMES E. MORRIS, M. PATTERSON, J. L. GARDNER, HENRY B. BRYAN and Z. SLADE, a committee to make the nominations.

Pending the deliberations of the committee our reporter adjourned, and consequently, we are unable to give the names of the gentlemen selected. Shall do so in our next.

MORE BANKS.—We learned last evening from a gentleman just from Raleigh, that the Finance or Bank Committee to whom the subject of the banking interest in our State had been referred, have reported favorably to the scheme of the Governor, in his late message, of changing the stocks or capital so invested, into the National banking system. We are glad to hear this way it is certainly the speediest and most judicious for of reclaiming the lost fortunes of the banks, and offers means of the most certain and speedy relief to the public.

CHANGED OUR MIND.—We mentioned casually in our last issue, that it might be a question, whether Judge MANLY could hold the office of Mayor and his seat in the Legislature at the same time. But upon further examination of the subject, we are convinced that we were in error. The office of Mayor or Councilman in a city is an office of a private and not a public character like that of a President or Director in a railroad or banking corporation, and, hence, would offer no impediment to the holding of a public office.

HER LAST APPEARANCE.—To-night is the benefit and last appearance of the popular lyric artist, Madame CARLOTTA POZZONI. By particular request, the beautiful drama "Colleen Bawn," so effectively rendered last week, will be repeated. Inasmuch as this will be the last time Mme. P. will appear on our boards, we bespeak for her, a parting benefit which she will long remember. There are those in the city who should not forget her claims on this occasion, but remember her efforts to while away the heavy hours of the winter evenings.

FIRE.—A pitch taylor attached to the turpentine distillery of TAYLOR & DANIELS, on South Front street, foot of Muddy, caught fire yesterday morning. Its contents and the shed under which it was built, were consumed. Loss trifling.

The Wilmington Journal asks—when will civil law be established in our midst?

This question still continues to recur to our mind day after day, and our desire for it urgently increases. We are now in a most deplorable condition. Murder and arson roam abroad over the face of our community, while the hand of justice is powerless to strike. When, may we ask, will the power of justice be fully resumed, and her hand be enabled to strike with sufficient force to be felt, so that her dominion may be seen and felt by all who are provokers of her wrath? Daily, aye, almost hourly, do we feel the want of her power to avenge and protect. But patience; a day of retribution will come ere long, and those who now smile with scorn in her very face will soon appear in her presence with fear and trembling.

TELEGRAPHIC.

XXXIXth Congress.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The House recommended the constitutional amendment in relation to representation, without instructions to the Committee on Reconstruction, and afterwards went into consideration of the Senate bill to enlarge the powers of the Freedmen's Bureau. A resolution extending the courtesy of the floor to members elect from Arkansas was disagreed to.

The Senate was engaged in the discussion of a bill giving protection to persons in their civil state.

Mr. Trumbull withdrew the amendment offered yesterday declaring all persons of African descent, born in the United States, citizens thereof, and substituting "all persons born in the United States, or not subject to any foreign power, are declared citizens, without distinction of race, color, etc."

From Mexico.
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 30.—Official correspondence between Weitzel and Mejia in relation to the Bagdad affair is published. The former states that he sent 300 men to Bagdad as an act of humanity, not to perform military service. Mejia replied briefly that he had notified his government of the occurrences. The French naval commander, before he departed to Vera Cruz to report matters officially, protested against the invasion of Mexico by American soldiers.

New York Market.
NEW YORK, Jan. 30.—Cotton advanced one. Sales twenty-three hundred bales, at 49@50. Gold 40½.

AN EDITORIAL BRUTUS.—An editor out west indulges in the following talk to his subscribers and patrons. The famous speech of Brutus on the death of Caesar, as rendered by Shakspeare, is made to do new service in this amusing travesty:
"Hear us for our debts, and get ready that you may pay; trust us, we have need, as you have long been trusted; acknowledge your indebtedness, and dive into your pockets that you may promptly fork over. If there be any among you—one single patron—that don't owe us something, then to him we say, step aside, consider yourself a gentleman. If the rest wish to know why we dun them, this is our answer: not that we care about ourselves, but our creditors do. Would you rather that we went to jail, and you go free, than you pay your debts and keep us moving? As we agreed, we have worked for you; as we contracted, we have furnished the paper to you, but as you don't pay, we dun you."

Here are agreements for job work, contracts for subscriptions, promises for long credit, and duns for deferred payment. Who is there so green that he don't take a paper? If any, he need not speak, for he don't mean him. Who is there so green that he don't advertise? If any, let him slide; he ain't the chap either. Who is there so mean that he don't pay the printers? If any, let him speak, for he's the man we're after."

THE COOLIE TRADE.—The London and China Telegraph of the 4th instant says:
Of the thirty ships now lying at anchor in the harbor of Macao, sixteen are chartered for Havana with slaves. All these vessels will, as is the custom, ship a number of coolies in excess of their contract, in order to have the means of supplying the places of those who may die on the voyage. It is curious that no one has, as yet, found out why so many of the coolies lose their sight on the voyage. Out of a cargo of five hundred, forty will be completely blind before they arrive at their destination; and as, according to the terms of the charter party, the baracoona owner will pay for and receive those that arrive in possession of their eyesight, the unfortunate blind are probably cast into the sea, or landed upon some desert island, for the government will not permit any Chinaman to live in Havana unless he belongs to a master.

Mexican News.
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.
Advices from Mexico to the 5th inst., state that the Liberal General Corona holds a position within 40 miles of Mazatlan. Although a strong force of French was at the latter place Corona remained undisturbed. He does not attack, knowing that he could not hold the place if he took it.

Much distress existed in the country, and famine prices for food prevailed.
In Chihuahua all was well.
The Liberal government was again established at the City of Chihuahua, and need fear no further molestation from the French.
Durango was still in the hands of the French and traitors; but Liberal forces were encircling the city in considerable numbers, and a fight was looked for soon.

At a recent revival meeting in the West, says the Chicago Times, prayer was requested for a young man who "is in Boston, far away from God." This is very probable. If the young man ever does find what his friends want him to find, it will only be after he has changed his present residence.
