THE ESCAPE. James O. Barefoot, it appears, made his escape from, or, rather, walked out of the military prison, with the sentinel on duty at the time, on Wednesday night. He has not been heard from since; but the sentinel has been ar-

rested and is now in confinement. Barefoot had recently been tried by a military commisson here, on a charge of murdering a negro man, in Columbus County, some months since, but the verdict of the commission had not transpired. Messrs. McMillan and McGill, had been also

ried by a similar commission, some time since, on the charge of murdering a man named Sykes in Bladen County, about the close of the war. As in the case of Barefoot, they had not been sentenced; but the impression prevailed that the citizens in all States. they had been convicted, and would either be sentenced to death, or imprisonment for a num-

They made their escape on Friday morning between three and four o'clock, through the agency of the sentinel who was guarding the end of the building in which they were confined. A hole was made through the wall, back of the fireplace, at which point it was only twelve inches in thickness. The dimensions of the hole, as measured by our reporter on the spot were fifteen by nineteen inches. The bayonet was the instrument chiefly used in making the aperture, though a very large jack-knife, found near the place, probably contributed somewhat towards the removal of the bricks.

The soldier who "used the bayonet" so well, accompanied the escaped prisoners in their flight, and it is supposed received some compensation for his services. We learn that no information has yet been received of the direction taken by the prisoners. — Wilmington Dispatch.
