### FROM OUR EVENING EDITION.

#### MAYOR'S COURT.

Tuesday, April 10.—Before His Honor, Mayor  
WASHINGTON.  
The first case on the docket was that against  
Jacob Turner and John Newson, negroes, for  
"playing policemen" in the city. It turned out  
that they were members of the police force of  
"Hayti," across the Trent, and instructions were  
given the chief of police to obtain positive evi-  
dence of the fact. They were sent back to their  
own headquarters.

Robert Custis, colored, accused of stealing  
flour, was committed for trial before the Superi-  
or Court.

ARRESTED.—Last Sunday morning a week ago,  
a young man by the name of JOHN F. DIXON was  
shot by a negro whom he had caught in the act  
of stealing. This morning the police arrested  
GODFREY BECTON on the charge of shooting him.  
The other negro who was with GODFREY at the  
time of the shooting is supposed to be named  
HATCH, but he has not been taken into custody,  
the small-pox having already performed that  
duty. GODFREY BECTON says he can prove that  
he has not been in Newbern in two weeks, until  
this morning.

RAIN, HAIL AND SNOW.—Verily winter is li-  
gering in the lap of spring. The chilly, rainy  
character of the weather yesterday made people  
forget their summerish apparel, and again over-  
coats and fire was the order of the day. But the  
"oldest inhabitant" must have felt gloomy this  
morning from finding that during the night,  
there had been a storm in trio—rain, hail and  
snow. How it will effect gardening and fruit,  
remains to be seen. At all events, the sun is  
out to-day and we hope for the best results for  
his seasonable appearing.

TRIAL OF MAJ. GEE.—The Military Commis-  
sion, sitting in the trial of Maj. John H. Gee,  
met again yesterday, and, after the reading of  
the journal, Mr. Holland, Counsel for the de-  
fense, moved to quash the proceedings, on the  
ground that the late proclamation of President  
Johnson, declaring that hostilities had ceased,  
and that the ordinary judicial process could be  
executed by the civil authorities in this and other  
Southern States, late in rebellion, and restoring  
the writ of *habeas corpus*, and that, therefore,  
martial law had ceased, and the tribunals created  
to execute it had determined within the States  
named. He argued in favor of the motion at  
considerable length, and cited numerous authori-  
ties to sustain the position he took.

The Judge Advocate asked that the motion be  
not entertained, on the ground that the Court  
had no official evidence of the genuineness of the  
Proclamation.

The Court over-ruled the objection. The  
Judge Advocate then asked time to prepare his  
answer to the argument of the defence in regard  
to the question of jurisdiction, which was accorded  
to by the Court.

The Court then adjourned to 10 o'clock to-  
day.

We will endeavor to give, in our next issue, a  
synopsis of the argument for and against the  
motion of the defense.—*Raleigh Standard.*

MILITARY.—THE POST OF KALEIGH.—We learn  
that Major Carr, brevet colonel in the U. S. cav-  
alry, is in command of this post, having relieved  
the late commandant, Col. R. K. Miller, 128th  
regiment Indiana volunteers.

The troops stationed here comprise Light Bat-  
tery E, U. S. artillery; companies A and B, of  
the 8th regiment U. S. regular infantry, and com-  
panies A and G, of the 5th U. S. cavalry, with  
Co. A, 28th Michigan volunteer infantry.

The 128th Indiana infantry, viz: companies B  
and E have been relieved, preparatory to muster  
out.

The new post commandant comes among us  
with a fine reputation as a gallant officer, strict  
disciplinarian, and courteous gentleman. No  
doubt he will enjoy the regard and confidence of  
our citizens.—*Ral. Progress.*

CITY ORDINANCES.  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEWBERN, N. C.,  
April 7, 1866.

It is ordained by the Mayor and Councilmen of the  
City of Newbern that the following taxes be, and the  
same are hereby levied upon the various business occu-  
pations and professions of the citizens of Newbern, for  
the last twenty days of the month of April, to wit:  
1. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm,  
whose sales exceed twenty-five thousand dollars a year,  
six dollars.

2. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm,  
whose sales exceed fifteen thousand dollars, and are less  
than twenty five thousand a year, four dollars and fifty  
cents.

3. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm,  
whose sales exceed ten thousand dollars, and are less  
than fifteen thousand a year, three dollars.

4. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm,  
whose sales exceed five thousand dollars, and are less  
than ten thousand a year, one dollar and seventy-five  
cents.

5. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm,  
whose sales are less than five thousand dollars, and more  
than two thousand dollars a year, one dollar and twenty  
five cents.

6. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm,  
whose sales do not exceed two thousand dollars, and are  
more than five hundred a year, eighty-five cents.

7. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm,  
or shop keeper, whose sales exceed two hundred dollars,  
and are less than five hundred a year, sixty cents.

8. On all bankers, express companies, commission and  
forwarding merchants, auctioneers, lumber dealers, who  
exceed fifteen thousand dollars a year, six dollars; Pro-  
vided, That when a commission business is joined with  
some other business, one-half the tax only, herein speci-  
fied, shall be levied.

9. On all still yards where there are not more than two  
stills, six dollars, and an additional tax of one dollar and  
fifty cents for each additional still.

10. On all beer saloons where nothing but malt liquors  
are sold; all hotels whose receipts are less than fifteen  
thousand dollars a year, four dollars and fifty  
cents.

11. On all builders, (including house and ship-carpen-  
ters) bakers, blacksmiths, confectioners, steam  
cotton presses, cabinet makers, distillers and photo-  
graphic artists, dentists, eating houses, (including oyster  
houses) gas fitters and plumbers, grist mills, insurance  
agents, ice houses, jewelers and watch-makers, lumber-  
dealers, who do not saw their lumber; lawyers, livery-  
stable keepers, physicians and surgeons, painters, print-  
ing establishments, planing mills, newspaper and peri-  
odical dealers, soda water manufacturers and vendors,  
saw and blind makers, peddlars, steam railways, wagon-  
makers and wheel-wrights, theatrical exhibitions, con-  
certs, shows other than circuses and menageries, three  
dollars; Provided, that if dealing in newspapers and  
periodicals be combined with the sale of books, sta-  
tionery, &c., one-half the tax herein specified shall be levied  
and provided further, that when a soda fountain is used  
in connection with other business, one-half of the tax  
only herein named shall be collected.

12. On all barbers, book-sellers, druggers and cleaners,  
gun-smiths, shoe-makers and tailors, two dollars.

13. On all bowling alleys, one dollar and fifty cents.

14. On all billiard tables, when there are not more than  
two in one saloon, one dollar and fifty cents; where  
there are more than two, one dollar for each additional  
table.

15. On all hacks, two horse drays, and other two horse  
vehicles kept for hire, one dollar and twenty-five cents.

16. On all market stalls one dollar and twenty-five  
cents.

17. On all fish stands seventy-five cents.

18. On all one horse drays or carts, or other one horse  
vehicles kept for hire, fifty cents.

19. On all hawksters, embracing eating shanties, and  
fruit and pie stands, fifty cents.

It is ordained by the Mayor and Board of Councilmen  
of the City of Newbern, that no live hogs, shall be kept  
within the city limits from the first day of April to the  
first day of October, under penalty of not exceeding  
twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each offence.

It is ordained by the Mayor and Board of Councilmen  
of the City of Newbern, that no grave shall be dug in  
any of the cemeteries in and around the city, unless it be  
at least five feet deep, under a penalty not exceeding fifty  
dollars (\$50) for each offence.

1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Board of Councilmen  
of the City of Newbern, that hereafter no sick shall  
be made and used for a privy more than two feet (2 feet)  
deep; and that all sick now used, which are more than  
two feet deep, shall be filled up to the prescribed depth  
before the first day of May proximo.

2. It is further ordained, that it shall be the duty of  
the City Engineer, to inspect the same, and report to the  
Sanitary Committee, all such sinks as may be more than the  
prescribed depth, or that may need cleaning out or repair-  
ing.

3. It is further ordained, that it shall be the duty of  
all occupants of premises within the city limits to have  
the sinks on their premises cleaned out whenever notified  
to do so by the Sanitary Committee.

4. It is further ordained, that any person violating any  
of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be subject to  
a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each  
offence.
