MAYOR'S COURT.

Thursday, April 12.—Before His Honor, Mayor WASHINGTON.

The cases before His Honor this morning was of a trivial nature.

Sam Jackson, colored, charged with stealing money, was turned over to the Freedmen's Bureau.

Thos. Foy, colored, was fined 50 cts. for driving on the wrong side of the street.

Geo. Johnson, colored, was fined \$1 for presuming to cart around the city without license.

ALARMINGLY QUIET.—Our city, this forenoon and up to three o'clock, the hour of going to press, was alarmingly quiet. Nothing transpired out of which we could make even a third class local item that we could get wind of. This of course, is portentous of a great storm, and we shall expect to get something of importance before many days. Messrs. BROWN & POALK, auctioneers, on Craven street tried to raise a breeze of excitement by running an opposition auction, but the purses of their bidders were too light to sustain it, and it soon went down with the goods at the stroke of the hammer.

PUBLIC HEALTH.—We are requested by the Sanitary Committee of the City Council, to again draw the attention of the community to the importance of keeping the lots and premises in a cleanly condition. All refuse matter should be carefully collected in barrels and placed on the walks for removal. Cleanliness is of the utmost importance, and particular attention should be paid to yards, sinks, privies and cess-pools, where lime or chloride of lime should be freely sprinkled, as well as the adjoining walls and fences surrounding them whitewashed. Great care should be used to prevent the accumulation of stagnant water in cellars and yards.

HOUSES SHOULD BE WELL VENTILATED.
The Sanitary Committee are doing all in their power to protect the people against the ravages of the epidemic of cholera, the approach of which we anticipate; but it must be evident to all that we cannot do everything, and they, therefore, call upon all the citizens to co-operate with them every possible way in their power.

Sources of filth and impurity may exist without the knowledge of the public authorities, and every citizen should feel the necessity of keeping a watchful supervision of his premises, and when individual efforts are inadequate for their removal they should call upon the Sanitary Committee for assistance.

Wagons for removal of garbage will go through the streets of the City on every Tuesday and Friday. Barrels should be placed on the walk before 9 o'clock a. m.

SANITARY.—One of the best sanitary measures that can be inaugurated just now, would be the whitewashing of fences and out buildings, and the painting of dwellings. Precautionary movements of this kind might save much suffering and many lives, and besides, would add several hundred per cent. to the appearance of the city.

In our article of a robbery on South Front street in yesterday's TIMES, we omitted a part of the name, and said Mr. NELSON, whereas we would have said Mr. NELSON WHITFORD. We understand since that his loss is nearly a hundred dollars.

BRUSHING UP.—The Legislature, at its recent session, made an appropriation for repairing and cleaning up the State Capitol and grounds, pursuant to which we notice that the walks have been restored to their original lines, and the painters are engaged on the interior of the building, putting the walls in a new dress entirely. Mr. Wm. H. Hamilton, we understand, has undertaken the contract.—Standard

CITY ORDINANCES.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW BERN, N. C.

It is ordained by the Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Newbern, that the following taxes be, and the same are hereby levied upon the various business occupations and professions of the citizens of Newbern, for the last twenty days of the month of April, to wit:

1. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales exceed twenty-five thousand dollars a year, six dollars.

2. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales exceed fifteen thousand dollars, and are less than twenty-five thousand a year, four dollars and fifty cents.

3. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales exceed ten thousand dollars, and are less than fifteen thousand a year, three dollars.

4. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales exceed five thousand dollars, and are less than ten thousand a year, one dollar and seventy-five cents.

5. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales are less than five thousand dollars, and are more than two thousand dollars a year, one dollar and twenty-five cents.

6. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales do not exceed two thousand dollars, and are more than five hundred a year, eighty-five cents.

7. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, or shop-keeper, whose sales exceed two hundred dollars, and are less than five hundred a year, sixty cents.

8. On all bankers, express companies, commission and forwarding merchants, auctioneers, lumber dealers, who saw their lumber, bar-rooms and hotels, whose receipts exceed fifteen thousand dollars a year, six dollars. Provided, That when a commission business is joined with some other business, one-half the tax only, herein specified, shall be levied.

9. On all still-wards where there are not more than two stills, six dollars, and an additional tax of one dollar and fifty cents for each additional still.

10. On all beer saloons where nothing but malt liquors and ciders are sold, and where the receipts are less than fifteen thousand dollars a year, four dollars and fifty cents.

11. On all builders, (including house and ship-carpenters) bakers, butchers, blacksmiths, confectioners, steam cotton presses, cabinet makers, Agri-cultor and photographic artists, dentists, eating houses, (including oyster houses) gas fitters and plumbers, grist mills, insurance agents, ice houses, jewelers and watch-makers, lumber dealers, who do not saw their lumber, lawyers, livery stable keepers, physicians and surgeons, painters, printing establishments, planing mills, newspaper and periodical dealers, soda water manufacturers and vendors, and blind makers, steam railroads, wagon makers and wheel-wrights, theatrical exhibitions, concert, shows other than circuses and menageries, three dollars; Provided, that if dealing in newspapers and periodicals be combined with the sale of books, sta-logy, &c., one-half the tax herein specified shall be levied and provided further, that when a soda fountain is used in connection with other business, one-half of the tax only herein named shall be collected.

12. On all barbers, book-sellers, dyers and cleaners, gun-smiths, shoe-makers and tailors, two dollars.

13. On all bowling alleys, one dollar and fifty cents.

14. On all Billiard tables, when there are not more than two in one saloon, one dollar and fifty cents; where there are more than two, one dollar for each additional table.

15. On all hacks, two horse drays, and other two horse vehicles kept for hire, one dollar and twenty-five cents.
