CITY ORDINANCES.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW BERN, N. C.,) April 7, 1866.

It is ordained by the Mayor and Councilmen of the City of Newbern, that the following taxes be, and the same are hereby levied upon the various business occupations and professions of the citizens of Newbern, for the last twenty days of the month of April, to wit : 1. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm. whose sales exceed twenty-five thousand dollars a year,

2. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales exceed fifteen thousand dollars, and are less than twenty-five thousand a year, four dollars and fifty

3 On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales exceed ten thousand dollars, and are less than fifteen thousand a year, three dollars. 4 On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales exceed five thousand dollars, and are less than ten thousand a year, one dollar and seventy-five

5. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales are less than five thousand dollars, and more than two thousand dollars a year, one dollar and twenty-6. On each and every merchant or mercantile firm, whose sales do not exceed two thousand dollars, and are

more than five hundred a year, eighty-five cents.
7. On each and every merchant or merchantile firm, or shop-keeper, whose sales exceed two hundred dollars, and are less than five hundred a year, sixty cents. 8. On all bankers, express companies, commission and forwarding merchants, auctioneers, lumber dealers, who saw their lumber, bar-rooms and hotels, whose receipts, exceed fifteen thousand dollars a year, six dollars; Provided, That when a commission busness is joined with some other business, one-half the tax only, herein speci-

fied, shall be levied. 9. On all still-yards where there are not more than two stills, six dollars, and an additional tax of one dollar and fifty cents for each additional still. 10. On all beer saloons where nothing but malt liquors and cider are sold; all hotels whose receipts are less than fifteen thousand dollars a year, four dollars and fifty

11. On all builders, (including house and ship-carpenters) bakers, butchers, blacksmiths, confectioners, steam cotton presses, cabinet makers, daguerrean and photographic artists, dentists, eating houses, (including oyster nouses) gas fitters and plumbers, grist mills, insurance agents, ice houses, jewelers and watch-makers, lumber dealers, who do not saw their lumber, lawyers, liverystable keepers, physicians and surgeons, painters, printing establishments, planing mills, newspaper and periodical dealers, soda water manufacturers and venders sash and blind makers, peddlars, steam railways, wagon-makers and wheel-wrights, theatrical exhibitions, conplease leave them at the Times Office for me prior to the thof May, 1866.

It is ordained by the Mayor and Board of Councilmen of the City of Newbern, that no live hogs, shall be kept within the city limits from the first day of April to the first day of October, under penalty of not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each offence. It is ordained by the Mayor and Board of Councilmen of the city of Newbern, that no grave shall be dug in any of the cemeteries in and around the city, unless it be

at least five feet deep, under a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50) for each offence.

1. It is ordained by the Mayor and Board of Council-men of the city of Newbern, that hereafter no sink shall be made and used for a privy more than two feet (2 feet) two feet deep, shall be filled up to the prescribed depth

before the first day of May proximo.

2. It is further ordsined, That it shall be the duty of the Sanitary Inspector to inspect the sinks aforesaid from time to time, and report to the Sanitary Committee all such sinks as may be more than the prescribed depth, or that may need cleaning out or repairing.

3. It is further ordained, That it shall be the duty of

all occupants of premises within the city limits to have the sinks on their premises cleaned out whenever notified to do so by the Sanitary Committee.
4. It is further ordained, That any person vialating any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall be subject to fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars (\$25) for each
