THE CIVIL AND MILITARY COURTS.-From conversations we have heard on the subject of the difficulty between the civil and military authorities referred to in vesterday's Times, we are convinced that the true object of the council for the detendent, is not understood. Of course his first object was to have justice done his client, but the main leading object in contesting so thoroughly, the action of the freed-man's court, was to settle what he conceives to be an important question of jurisdiction as between the two tribunals. Earl Grosvenor declared his intention to support the Government, and said it had never been his desire to pass a vote of censure upon them. He hoped the amendment would be withdrawn, because if successful it would both defeat the cill and turn out the Government. After a long debate, Mr. Gladstone, in a calm speech, declared that the bill had been deliberately presincere and earnest on the question, that a grave responsibility would rest with those who de feated the desire to pass the measure, and that spirit of conciliation and compromise. On the conclusion of Mr. Gladstone's speech, Captain Hayter asked leave to withdraw his amendment. This was refused by the Ministerialists, who insisted on the vote, upon which the great mass of the Opposition trooped out of the House to avoid a division, amid the laughter and ironical cheers of the supporters of the bill.
