For instance, if a negro were to insult us, or a member of our family, we would knock him down just as quickly as we would a white man, and we suppose any one else would do the same thing, and it would be very unpleasant to us to be treated more harshly for the one act than for the other.

IF we commit an assault upon a white person, we have the advantage of a counsel and jury, as well as the right of bail, but should the difficulty occur with a negro, unless the civil is superior to the military law, we might be subjected to the same alternative that O'CONNOR was. We hope the case will be sent up to headquarters and decided, so that we may know what to depend upon.

EUROPEAN NEWS.—GREAT BRITAIN.—THE REFORM BILL. The debate on the Reform Bill was resumed in the House of Commons on the 4th inst., when a great number of speakers took part in the discussion.

THE MINISTERIAL CRISIS.—Speaking of the Ministerial crisis, the Times says: "There can indeed be no doubt that the critical relations between Austria, Prussia, Italy and France have saved the Ministry."

THE DAILY TELEGRAPH.—The Daily Telegraph says that the Reform Bill has passed safely into law. The enfranchisement of the working classes is the central point, and there Mr. Gladstone declared the government was and would be immovable.

THE DAILY NEWS.—The Daily News says that the conduct of the Government in maintaining their ground has tended not only to restore a healthy and energetic liberal feeling to the Liberal party, but to check the feeling of despondency which has been the result of the speeches of Mr. Lowe.

PERSONAL LIBERTY LAWS SUSPENDED.—An Imperial decree has been issued suspending for the present, on account of the dangers menacing the protection of personal liberty and inviolability in Venice, the Italian seaboard, Gorzard Gradisca, Southern Tyrol, and Dalmatia.

THE AUSTRIAN ARMY.—According to the Austrian Military Gazette, the Austrian army now amounts to 800,000 men. The army of operations will consist of 600,000, of whom 350,000 will oppose the Prussians, and 250,000 the Italians.

VIENNA ITEMS.—The latest dispatches look decidedly warlike. The Vienna papers regard the position of affairs as very threatening. An imperial ordinance was published at Vienna on the 5th, ordering that ships of war belonging to nations in amity with Austria be permitted to cast anchor on the coast.

THE LOWER HOUSE OF THE HUNGARIAN DIET.—The Lower House of the Hungarian Diet had instructed the Financial Committee to propose measures for reduction by the Diet, as preparatory to the commercial distress which threatens the country.

RUSSIA TO DECLARE WAR.—The daily News of the 6th says: "Appearance indicate that the declaration of war, or the manifesto to it, will proceed from Prussia. The King of Prussia has issued a circular note to the several Powers, charging the Government of Austria with a flagrant breach of treaties by re-issuing the Holstein succession to the Diet, and a rising accusation has been formally made in the Prussian Diet."
