While the quieting of titles is deemed very important and desirable, the discrimination in the bill seems objectionable, as does als , the attempt to confer upon the Commissioners judic.al powers by which citizens of the United States are to be deprived of their property in a mode contrary to that provision of the Constitution which declares that no person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law. As a general principle such legislation is unsafe, unwise, partial and unconstitutional. It may deprive persons of their property who are equally deserving obects of the nation's bounty as those whom, by this legislation, Congress seeks to benefit. The title to the land thus to be por ioned out to a favored class of citizens must depend upon the Aegd mr Henry regularity of the tax sales under the law as it exis ed at the time of the sale, and no subsequent legislation can give validity to the rights thus acquired as against the original claimant. The attention . f Congress is, therefore, invited to & more mature consideration of the measures proposed in these sections of the bill.

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
