CITY ORDINANCES.

It is Ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of New-Berne, That from and after date of this Ordinance, all houses shall close at 10 o'clock, a. m.
It is further Ordained, That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances conflicting herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.
It is further Ordained, That from and after date, the sale of Bread on Sunday shall be confined to the City limits of New-Berne, and that said places shall close at 10 o'clock, a. m.
It is further Ordained, That all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances conflicting herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.
It is further Ordained, That from and after date, the sale of all kinds of liquors, and other articles, shall be confined to the City limits of New-Berne, and that said places shall close at 10 o'clock, a. m.
It is further Ordained, That a tax of One Dollar per head upon each and every Dog within the city limits, be and the same is hereby levied for the year ending December 31st, 1869. Each dog shall wear a collar with a number attached, said number to be furnished by the City Clerk upon the payment of ten cents and the tax.
It is further Ordained, That any and all dogs found within the city limits without such number after July 1st, shall be taken in charge by the City Marshal and his assistants and kept for three days, subject to redemption by the owner thereof upon payment of tax and one dollar for keeping. If not redeemed within the time specified, then said dogs to be killed.
It is further Ordained, That from and after date, no cart, wagon, or other vehicle be allowed to stand upon any of the streets of the city, and sell goods or merchandise therefrom, after 9 o'clock, a. m.; Provided, That this Ordinance shall not apply to vehicles coming from without the city.
It is further Ordained, That the Ordinance in relation to the sale of grain by weight, be and the same is hereby repealed.
It is further Ordained, That section seventeen of the City License Tax Ordinance, be and the same is hereby repealed.
It is further Ordained, That from and after date, any and all persons (except Policemen, while in the discharge of their duty) who shall discharge firearms within the city limits, and who are not licensed to do so, shall be fined for each and every offence.
Resolved, That the Meat and Fish stands at the People's Market be allowed to remain open until 9 o'clock, a. m. Sundays.

Shamyl, the vanquished hero of the Caucasus, is making a pilgrimage to Mecca, where he is likely to meet Abd-el-Kader, whose daughter, by the way, has become a convert to Christianity, to the sincere chagrin of the Arab Chief. However, he had the good sense to let the young girl follow Hamlet's advice to "obedience and go to a nunnery."

The youngest brother of Frances Joseph, the Archduke Louis Victor, is much admired in Paris. He is a young man of highly distinguished appearance, of a pleasant, sociable nature, and with the same melancholy cast of countenance which fascinated the ladies so much in Maximilian of Mexico. There is no danger, however, of Louis Victor giving any trouble to Juarez and Grant.

The Duke de Chartres, the second son of the Duke of Orleans, and McClellan's volunteer aide-de-camp during the Peninsula campaign, has gone to Brussels to review the proof sheets of a military work, entitled "The Battle Fields on the Banks of the Rhine," in which he tries to prove that it is impossible for France, in her present condition, to undertake a campaign in that direction.

Gen. Robert E. Lee was a delegate to the Protestant Episcopal Convention of Virginia, which met last week in Fredericksburg, and was of course the recipient of marked attentions from the natives. One day a Yankee carpet-bagger drove up to the house in which he was staying, and sent in a request that Gen. Lee would "come out and see him." The General, "with his usual affability," consented, and the inquisitive stranger departed highly pleased with the interview.

A countryman exposed his watch on the corner of a street in New Haven on Wednesday, when a bystander offered to buy \$5 that it was not gold. Countryman accepted the bet, and it was taken to a jeweller's and pronounced a gold watch. The stranger handed the countryman the money and said, "You have won; here's your money and watch," and then left.
