Fire in Williamstown. We learn from the Tarboro' Southern that the town of Williamstown has been visited with fire, on Saturday morning last and three stores destroyed, with a loss of ten thousand dollars, partially covered by insurance. The origin of the fire was, it is supposed, incendiary.

Congressional Committees. The following are the committee appointments of North Carolina's delegation in Congress: Hon. C. B. Thomas, Committee on Elections; Hon. C. B. Cobb, Chairman of the Committee on Freedmen's Affairs, and member of the Committee on Revolutionary Pensions, and war of 1812; Hon. Francis E. Shober, member of the Committee on Mines and Mining and Expatriates of the Postoffice Department; Hon. A. M. Waddell, member of the Committee on the Instructional State.

The two most important of the foregoing Committees are those upon which Messrs. Thomas and Waddell has been appointed.

Burglar Shot. We learn from the Tarboro' Southern that a burglar effected an entrance into the jewelry store of Mr. Rawls, of that town, which was at the time occupied only by a fifteen year old boy. The burglar threatened the boy with instant death, but while the would-be robber was preparing the planter for transportation the boy managed to secure a pistol and made a hole in the burglar somewhere, for he at once "hit out," leaving a track of blood as he went. The burglar was not recognized nor has he been apprehended.

Supreme Court. The Supreme Court meets in Raleigh the first Monday in January '72, the Hon. Richmond M. Pearson, Chief Justice of North Carolina, presiding. The business of this body for the January term will be taken up in the following routine: First week first and second Districts; Second week fourth and fifth Districts; Third week third and seventh Districts; Fourth week eighth and ninth Districts; Fifth week tenth and eleventh Districts; Sixth week twelfth and sixteenth Districts. Applicants for license to practice law will be examined on Monday of the first week. The order of examination will run as follows: Rights of Property, Practice and Pleading, and the Code of Civil Procedure.—Raleigh Carolinaian.

City Finances. We have received from E. R. Sturdy, Esq., a statement of the receipts and disbursements of the City Government, for the seven months of the present year, commencing May 1st to December 1st.

The statement is made out in monthly sheets, showing the amount received and expended each month, and to whom expended.

Under the present municipal law it is necessary to make out seven copies of the statement, one for each Ward, to be posted in some prominent

place. From the statement before us it appears that during the period specified there has been received for current expenses:

Table with financial data: From License Tax, \$1,367.90; Court Fines, 642.39; Real Estate, 1,405.67; Total, \$3,416.04.

Amount disbursed for Current Expenses, \$3,280.49; Balance, \$55.55.

There are yet some bills unpaid, amounting perhaps to four or five hundred dollars, but on the whole the above is a very creditable exhibit, demonstrating as it does that the Board have made efforts to keep within the paltry bounds prescribed by the Legislature, and they have some hope of doing just as any other city in New-Bern should do.

As we have stated, copies of a detailed statement of disbursements, and containing the name of every individual that has drawn a cent from the Treasury for the past seven months will be posted, one in each Ward to-day, when every citizen will have an opportunity of examining the matter for himself.
