KENTUCKY.

FRANKFORT, Nov. 6 .- Returns indicate a full Republican, and a falling off of one third of the Democratic vote. Greeley's majority is probably 10,000. Democratic Congressmen are elected in every District, NEW YORK.

New York, Nov. 6 .-- The Herald's election estimates gives to Grant 28 State , and to Greeley 8 States, or 268 Electoral votes for Grant to 90 for Greeley. The popular majority for Grant is placed at 350,000. The Herald editorially says that whether the

result will be accounted for by the popu-Lir strength of Gen. Grant on one hand, or weakness of Greeley, and feebleness of the Liberal Republicans combined, with the Demcratic bolt on the other hand, it is in many respects the most remarkable Presidential election in the history of the country.

The Tribune gives Graut 232 Electoral votes at the low-st and 78 for Greeley, with the rest doubtful. Washington, Oct. 6. Th se who have conversed with President Grant and his more intimate friends in Washington during the past month will remember that they uninformly predicted such a result of the Presidential election as has just occurred. They seemed to possess ditt from gentlemen in different parts of the country which just fied them in their bopes and prospects, now fully realized. The President to-day received calls of congratulations in addition to numerous telegrams of greeting, and also announcing results. He expressed thanks to his guests for these manifestations of friendship, and apart from the political issues involved was gratified. that the people had vindicated his private character, which had been assailed during the cinvos, that there will be at least one change in the Cabinet at the commencement of the next Presidential term, there is no question. It is known that Seretary Fish has recently expressed his wish-s to be relieved from the position of Secretary of State. This desire will be gratified at the end of the present term. There is no prob :bility of a change of Attorney General Judge Williams recently remarked that al though he could have been elected Senator from Oregon, he declined be bg a candidate in order that he might remain in his pr sent office. There is good reason for statug that any remarks with regard to the other members of the Cabinet would be mere speculation. but it may be said that the commissions of all of them will expire at the close of the present term, thus necessitating new commissions to those serving as Cabinet offi ers after the 4th of March next. It is too early to anticipate the President's action in the future concerning reforms and measures of administration, furth than his intimation to-day that he will so en deavor to shape his official conduct as to unite at home and abroad,


