Public Meeting. At a meeting of the citizens of Newbern, held at the Court House Oct. 15th, 1873, to take steps to aid in the relief of the sufferers of Memphis. On motion, Alex. Justice, Esq. was called to the chair, and Wm. M. Watson appointed Secretary.

The chairman having briefly stated that the object of the meeting was to devise means of aiding in the relief of the sufferers of Memphis, the following committee was appointed to solicit contributions for that purpose: Wm. M. Watson, Julius Ash, D. T. Carraway.

On motion, the committee was instructed to forward such sums as might be obtained by them, directly to the proper authorities at Memphis. On motion, the meeting adjourned. ALEXANDER JUSTICE, Chairman. Wm. M. WATSON, Secretary.

By reference to the above, it will be seen that our citizens have moved in the humane matter of aiding in the relief of suffering Memphis. We are greatly pleased to see that our little city does not purpose to be behind in this labor of love and mercy. We learn from the committee that they have been very successful in soliciting, having received some \$60 at the meeting.

School Statistics. We are indebted to James C. Harrison, Esq., Register of Deeds, for the following statistics in relation to the number of children between the ages of 5 and 21 years in the various townships of Craven County. The compilation of these returns is for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1873.

Of white children there were, Males, 974 Females, 999 Total, 1973. The White School Districts number twenty-nine, with only eight school houses sixteen private schools, and one Academy, the attendance of White Scholars at the public schools has been 548, Male and Female, and 297, in private Schools while 1128, attended no school.

Of colored children there were, Males, 1859 Females, 2014 Total, 3873. The Colored School Districts number thirty-three, with eleven public schools and 10 private school houses. The attendance at the public schools was 1172, Male and Female, at private schools 367, while 2324, was the number of non attendants.

D. G. M. Thos. M. Gardiner, assisted by Roanoke Lodge F. & A. M., will lay the corner stone of M. E. Church at Weldon to-day. The store belonging to the Mission School of the first Presbyterian Church of Wilmington, was stolen some time ago and was found in the possession of a colored man Tuesday.

FROM WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, Oct. 14. The President received the delegates of the Evangelical Alliance to-day, and in response to address of Rev. Dr. Tiffany said: It affords me much pleasure to welcome this Alliance to the Capitol of this great nation, which I feel is the freest of all nations to work out the problem of your mission.

Rev. Henry Ward Beecher being called upon said: I have also profound respect for the President of the United States, as he is almost the man who thinks a good deal and can hold his peace. Addresses were also made by Rev. Narrain Sheshadri, of Bombay, and Rev. Matteo Prochet, of Italy.
