PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE. deut's message, and opens by a reference to the financial crisis, the Grangers movement and the Virginius matter, which, it says, is in course of negotration and is likely to be amicably adjusted and honorably. It refers to the Vienna Exposition, which was creditable to the artisans of the United States: to the reception of the Western Ambassadors by the Emperor of China, and to the next of farther legislation to suppress the infamous coolie trade: it recommends a commission for the E purpose of auditing and determining by the Confederate privateers; it refers to the Mixed Commission for determining claims between the British su jects and American citizens, and asks for an appropriation to pay the amount of the decisions agains the United States; it also recommends a law creating a special court, consisting of three judges, to hear and determine all claims of aliens against the United Sta'es aris-

Ing out of damages committed against the Oersons and property during the insurrection; it asks the decision of Congress on the subject of the action of the Ottoman and Egyptian Governments, relieving foreign Consols of ju-

dical powers. The President transmits the application of the Republic of Santo Dominge that the United States shall exercise a protectorate over that Republic. The message discusses at some length, the question of the right of extradition, particularly as to citizens of the United States who are residing permaneatly abroad with their families, and suggests legislation on the subject. It refers to the establishment of a Republie in Spain, and to the efforts of the new government to abolish slavery in all its dominions, which efforts are opposed by the reactionary slaveholders of Cuba, who are vainly striving to stop the march of civilization; this baleful influence had thus succeeded in defeating the efforts of all liberal minded men in Sp in to abolish slavery in Cubs in preventing the proposed reforof humanity, of civilization, and progress, it was to be hoped that the evil influence might be soon averted. The President expressed his conviction that the existense of African slavers in Caba is a principal cause of the la mentable condition of the Island, and loes not doubt that Congress share his hopes that it will soon be made to disappear, and that peace and prosperity will follow its abolition. JUNOTION GRANTED.

It will be seen from the opinion of Judges Bond and Brooks, published below, that the motion for an injunction in the case of Alfred Self et al. vs. Jenkins, Public Treasurer of North Carolina, has been refused. We copy from the official records : 4.450 M

We are of opinion-Ist. That the acts of the General Assembly of North Carolina of 1868-69, which an horized the issue of the Special Tux Bonds which are the subject of this snit, are valid acts, and that the acts of 1870-71 which were intended to mo lify or repeal the acts of 1868-'69, are unconstitutional and void, being obnoxious to that clause of the Constitution of the United States which forbids the S'ate to pass any law impairing the obligations of a contrac .

We are of opinion that a bona Ade holder of a bond issued under the acts in question is not precluded from receiving the amount of his debt, because the fact is that at the time of issuing his boud the State bonds were not at par, nor by the reason of the nonfulfillment of any of the privious conditions imposed upon the Legislature before it issned the bonds.

It is sufficient, we think, if the power to issue the bonds is given and was exercised. The Legislature, and not the purchaser, is to see to the fulfillment of the conditions imposed upon the exercise of its power.

Weare of opinion, however, it is not shown in this case that any irreparable injury is likely to occur to the complainant by reason of any proposed action of defendant, and we shall, therefore refuse the injunction prayed, and let the complainant await whatever relief he may be entitled to after final

hearing." It will be seen that the Judges decide that the bonds issued in 1868-'69 are constitutional, and that the subsequent legislation repealing the appropriations are unconstitutional and void. But inasmuch as no irreparable injury is threatened, the injunction is refused. We have only space to-day to express our gratification at that part of the decision which relieves the State Treasury. That portion of the opinion touching the constitutionality of the bonds is only incidental. The point was not argued fully by the counsel for the Treasurer. - Ral. News.
