Letter from Mr. Oaksmith. LANGHAM HOTEL, LONDON, Dec. 5, 1873. Elitor New Berne Times :

Dear Sir.-I send you enclosed a slip cut from one of the leading financial organs, in regard to " The Midland North Carolina Bailway Company." As it is a matte deeply affecting the interests of New Berne, I felt that it would

It has been a source of surprise and regret to me that the position of New Berne on our State Railway question has been so little appreciated or understood; or when it has been understood, bas met with such bitler opposition. Naturally, she should be the Glasgow of our State-and in time she will be if her citizens are only true to themselves. The interests of New Berne, Morehead and Beaufort are identical, for whatever infinences are brought to bear to build up one, will build up all. New Berne can never be ontstripped in wealth and population if her citizens are faithful to their own interests and their duties to posterity. Looking about the world, after long years of

trial, which necessarily have brought me some experience, for a final home wherein to set my household altar-for a field worthy an earnest man's endeavors-I have found none that seemed to me to so much need relations with the rich trans-Atlantic centre of finance and trade as Eastern North Carolina. The chances for immediate results to me, seemed very slender: the country was poor, the people disheartened, the future very far from promising; and yet, having weighed all things well-the people; the country; the natural advantages; the disadvantages; the water communications; the harbors; the bars; the railways; everything-I came to ed part of our State-with Eastern North Carolina, and to take her, if she would me, "for better or for worse, until death doth us part." Having come to this determination, I sought to lay the basis for great work-involving years of future labour -- in the interest of our section and of the entire State-upon a firm foundstion. Many of our citizens have been vaguely informed of my efforts: but I have hitherte been absolutely silent-for I am not one of those who talk for the sake of talk, or waste interest. I have been at work steadily, earnestly and to the point. I will not weary the public with useless details, but will come at

once to the point. I very early saw that all our future capital. for the development of our interests, must come from London Our needs I could see plainly enough-but with a discredited Statewith men of influence openly preaching the suicidal policy of repudiation-with no banks to facilitate negotiations, and a general financial demoralization pervading all classes, it was hard to see the means to accomplish the end, or supply those needs. I, however, set myself to work to discover those means. I think, after months of effort and investigation, I have found

Space will not permit me to go into the question at the present moment. I defer it until I can give a personal account of my Stewardship-but I desire to call the attention of my fellow-citizens of New Berne, Morehead and Beaufort to the necessity of unanimity of action. New Berne must lend the van-her citizens must rganize. Every consideration in the way of her prosperity should be thrown aside-even St. Nichrias. "What Might Have Been Ex- to that curse of our State, politics. We should establish a Chamber of Commerce, whose voice should be an authority on questions affecting our interests, and whose councils should be directed by the highest wisdom in our milst, so that the world would respect its opinions. On the important subject of our Railways, a citizens committee should be formed to take into consideration matters of the most vital interest to New Berne, which will have to be considered at an early day.

The merchants should move in this matter. Let Democrats and Republicans form one united party on the most important question of protecting our own local interests. We should take some hope to ourselves when we consider that six hundred millions of dollars is the present annual surp'us of interest received in London, which must be invested somewhere, every year, and that this amount is steadily increasing. I have been seeking for the means of enlisting some of this surplus capital for our poor old State. I make no rash promises-but I predict if our citizens of New Berne will all unite upon one common purpose and the right scheme, we will run a train of cars within two years from Beaufort to Memphis-and within three we will have our own Line of Steamers to Europe. I put this prediction on record with the proviso that we are supported by our fellow-citizens. I also put the further prediction upon record, that if we are defeated it will be by certain citizens of our State who have always played "the dog in the manger" policy regarding Eastern North Carolina. Whatever may be done in the future, let the citizens of New Berne now look to their interests. Upon my return I shall be glad to confer with them regarding their future and their interests, and if it meets the general approbation, would suggest that a "New Berne Citizens' Committee" be organized at once.
