At 12 o'clock the bill to amend an act incorporating the New River Canal, was taken up on its third reading.

The bill passed its third reading by a vote of 26, nays 14.

On motion of Mr. Worth, the bill for the adjustment of the State debt was made the special order for 12 o'clock to-morrow.

At 10:30 A. M. Mr. Speaker Robinson called the House to order.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

By Mr. Trivet, a resolution respecting Hon. A. M. Waddell and Hon. M. W. Ransom in regard to their action in relation to the repeal of the Congressional back pay act, referred to the Judiciary Committee.

By Mr. Dickey, a bill for the relief of persons entering vacant lands in the counties of Cherokee, Clay and Graham. Referred.

By Mr. Abbott, col., a bill to authorize the establishment of a Collegiate Institute for the benefit of the colored people of this State. Referred.

By Mr. Bowman, a bill to lay off and establish a new county by the name of Badger. Referred.

By Mr. Presson, a bill to raise revenue. Referred.

By Mr. Bennett, a bill to repeal all laws denoting any part of the State swamp lands. Referred.

Privileges and Elections, submitted reports from their respective committees. In submitting his report, Mr. Cowles desired to make an explanation to the effect that the bill reported by him was returned in order that it may be referred to the Judiciary Committee, as it embodied important constitutional questions.

On motion of Mr. Morehead, of Rockingham, the bill to change the time for holding the Courts of Chatham and Rockingham counties, was taken up and passed its several readings under a suspension of the rules. Both of these counties are in the same (7th) Judicial District, and the counties above named only make an even exchange of their time. The bill was, on motion, immediately enrolled.

The House bill to prevent the purchasing of cotton in less quantities than a bale, between the hours of sunset and sunrise, was, on motion of Mr. Ransom, taken up under a suspension of the rules and passed its several readings.

By Mr. Flemming, a bill to incorporate the North Carolina Gold Amalgamation Company. Referred.

By Mr. Cowles, a bill to amend chapter 71, laws 1871-72. Referred.

By Mr. Ellis, of Catawba, a bill to amend chapter 68, Battle's Revised. Referred.

By Mr. Murphy, a bill to amend chapter 89 and 26 of Battle's Revised. Referred.

By Mr. Ransom, a resolution in relation to the Albermarle and Chesapeake Canal. Lies over under the rules.

By Mr. McCauley, a bill concerning the deeds of married women. Referred.

By Mr. Flemming, a bill to amend section 198, chapter 17 of Battle's Revised.

The third reading of the bill for the support, repairs, improvement and payment of the debts of the Insane Asylum for the year A. D. 1874, came up as the special order at 11 o'clock, and passed without discussion. (The bill appropriates \$65,000.)

ther can bids, or interest in bids, be transferred or assigned to other parties. Bidders will therefore take notice that they will be expected to perform the service awarded to them through the whole contract term.
