'Strange Interlude' Coming To Liberty

Will Be Shown Thursday and Friday; Norma Shearer Is Featured

A rare treat is in store for moviegoers starting Thursday when "Strange Interlude," pictureization of the sensational Eugene O'Neill drama, opens at the Liberty Theatre with Norma Shearer and Clark Gable in the principal roles. This is the play which ran for a year and a half on Broadway as presented by the Theatre Guild with Lynn Fontanne in the role played on the screen by Miss Shearer.

The powerful O'Neill drama deals with the tragedy of a woman who finds she cannot have children because of a streak of insanity in her husband's family. Unwilling to rob her husband and herself of parental happiness, she hits upon a remarkable, ultra-modern plan for preserving their domestic tranquility, a device which involves the love of two other men and which eventually brings all four characters into the most difficult of dramatic complications.

The role of Nina Leeds in "Strange Interlude" is reported to be the most ambitious ever attempted by the talented Miss Shearer, both in the matter of psychological interpretation and acting power. The part is also said to call for an extraordinary feat in "makeup," for the action of the plot covers some thirty years, requiring the star to appear first as a young girl, then as a middle-aged matron and finally as a doddering old woman, a series of transitions comparable to that made by Helen Hayes in "The Sin of Madelon Claudet."

Not the least of the novelties in "Strange Interlude" is the fact that it retains the much discussed spoken-thoughts or "asides" of the original play. To accomplish this "double dialogue" effect, two separate sound recordings were made as the picture was filmed. The direction was in the hands of Robert Z. Leonard, who achieved such successful results with "The Divorcee," which won Miss Shearer the Motion Picture Academy award, and with "Susan Lenox," a recent Greta Garbo hit.

An outstanding cast supports Miss Shearer and Clark Gable in "Strange Interlude," including the well-known New York stage player, Alexander Kirkland; Ralph Morgan, who repeats the role he played in the original production; Robert Young, who recently scored in "The Wet Parade" and "New Morals for Old"; May Robson, remembered for her work as the bitter mother in "Lobby Lynton"; Maureen O'Sullivan of "Tarzan" fame; Henry B. Walthall, Mary Alden and Tad Alexander.

Many Given Work During February

Relief Expenditures Exceeded \$6,000; Much Activity Is Shown

Approximately \$6,245.26 was spent in carrying on relief work in Wilkes county during the month of February, according to the report of Mrs. Gilbert Foster, welfare superintendent, to the governor's office of relief.

Federal funds received during the month amounted to \$6,000, while funds from other sources raised the available money to \$7,564.66 from receipts of the month. The balance on hand on February 1 made the total money available \$8,193.29.

A total of 817 families were aided in some manner, while 27 non-family cases were helped.

The report shows that 713 men were given work through relief funds, 31,782 hours of labor being given them.

Mrs. Foster points out that a portion of the amount shown as private funds given for relief work was not donated in cash but in the form of labor and materials. Considerable direct aid was given during the month, but Mrs. Foster stated that no direct aid has been allowed in any family where there was as many as one person able to work.

Connor Convicted Of Manslaughter

Is Sentenced To From 30 Months To Four Years in State Prison

William Connor was found guilty of manslaughter Friday in Superior court and was sentenced to serve not less than 30 months nor more than four years in the state penitentiary. Judge Michael Schenck pronounced sentence Friday afternoon about 3 o'clock.

Tried on a charge of murdering Paul Barlow near this city on the morning of December 4, 1932, the jury found mitigating circumstances and returned a verdict of manslaughter. Barlow was cut in several places with a knife, one stab severing the jugular vein, it is stated.

Attorney J. M. Brown represented the defendant, while Attorney J. Hubert Whicker, of the local bar, and Attorney J. Hayden Burke, of the Taylorsville bar, relieved Solicitor John R. Jones as prosecuting attorney.

Senator Walsh Laid To Rest In Montana

Helena, Mont., March 9.—In a little valley emerging from historic Last Chance gulch and stretching before white-topped mountains, United States Senator Thomas J. Walsh was buried here today.

Thousands who had followed his climb from the humble beginning as a young lawyer to a leader of the nation through a score of years as senator, paid homage to his memory in St. Helena cathedral and about the state's capitol today.

The body arrived here by train early this morning from the national capitol. It was taken to the capitol to lie in state and then removed to the cathedral for solemn requiem mass.

After the services the body was taken to its final resting place in Resurrection cemetery, there to lie beside the body of the senator's first wife, Elinor McClements Walsh, who died in 1917.

RESOLUTION CALLING PRIMARY AND ELECTION FOR THE TOWN OF NORTH WILKESBORO.

At a meeting duly called of the Board of Elections for Wilkes county on motion duly seconded and carried, it is hereby ordered that the primary for the town of North Wilkesboro to nominate Mayor, Members of the Town Board of Commissioners and School Trustees for the town be held Monday, April 17, 1933, and that the election shall be held Tuesday, May 2nd, 1933; upon motion duly seconded and carried Robert Brame is hereby appointed registrar and that R. T. McNeill and Jeter Blackburn are hereby appointed judges to hold said municipal election and primary for the town of North Wilkesboro, and that said primary and election shall be conducted and carried on under and pursuant with the laws now in force governing town primaries and elections for the town of North Wilkesboro.

It is further ordered that said primary and election be held in the front room of the building known as the Call Hotel Building located on Main street; it is further ordered that the registration books be kept open for new qualified registrants at the Town Hall Saturday, March 18, 1933, Saturday, March 25, 1933, Saturday, April 1, 1933 and Saturday, April 8, 1933, and that Saturday, April 15, 1933, is hereby designated challenge day; and the registrar herein appointed shall be in the Town Hall on the Saturdays hereinbefore mentioned and discharge his duties as said registrar in accordance with the laws governing registration and challenging of voters.

That all qualified electors desiring to vote in the municipal primary and election for the town of North Wilkesboro, unless already registered for town elections, shall register at the place above designated on or before Saturday, April 8, 1933.

It is further ordered that all candidates for nomination for town offices and school trustees file their notice of candidacy at least five days before primary herein called, accompanied by a fee of two dollars, with the Chairman of Board of Elections for Wilkes County in accordance with the provisions of laws now governing primaries and elections for the town of North Wilkesboro.

It is further ordered that a copy of this resolution be posted on the door of the Town Hall for the town of North Wilkesboro and a copy be posted at the front door of the building known as the Call Hotel Building, and that a copy be published in one of the local newspapers for the town of North Wilkesboro.
