

Will Have Art Course

Class Organized Monday Evening; Dr. Derendinger To Be the Instructor

Dr. Ernest Derendinger Ph. D. of Catawba College, began a course in "Art Appreciation" Monday evening at the Wilkesboro school.

The class will meet each Monday at 7:00 p. m. and last for two hours. The course will include a study of art in America—architecture, sculpture, and painting. The lives and works of the best known artists will be studied. At each class one or two subjects of the European painters will also be studied. These may be suggested by the members of the class. Slides will be used to illustrate the lectures throughout the course.

An eight point course will be offered and both certificate and college credit will be given for it. The cost will be 25 per cent less than the price of former

years. Dr. Derendinger was born in Switzerland and was educated both in Europe and America. He has studied theology in Berlin and in the best colleges of America. He has made a specialty of art for many years and has taught it in Catawba College since 1925.

Any one from the public wishing to attend the lectures without credit may do so at a minimum charge.
