# Addressed By Two

John L. Morehead and Walter (Pete) Murphy Given En-thusiastic Hearing

URGE BIG REPEAL VOTE Say Prohibition-Created Racketeering and Crime Will Be Given Jolt

Urging a vote for repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment on November 7, John L. Morehead, Charlotte business man, and Walter (Pete) Murpny, Rowan county legislator, were given an enthusiastic hearing at the county-wide rally of Wilkes county reneal forces at the courthouse in Wilkesboro Tuesday evening.

Declaring that repeal is an integral part of the national administration's recovery program and that both Democratic and Church of America convened in Republican leaders were united in their stand for repeal, Mr. Murphy asserted that he had rather follow Franklin D. Roosevelt,, Elihu Root and other great leaders of the country than Johnson Hayes and Yates Webb.

The meeting was called to or der by W. H. McElwee, prominent young local attorney, who presented H. H. Morehouse Wilkes county's repeal delegate Mr. Morehouse said he had no intention of making a speech and would merely reiterate his stand for repeal.

Major A. L. James, Jr., a retired army officer of Laurinburg, who accompanied Mr. Morehead was presented and in a few, well chosen words declared that prohibition had been a failure. has been the greatest force for evil that has ever existed," said.

Mr. Morehead was introduced by Attorney J. M. Brown. The Charlotte man advocated a return to the doctrine of state's rights through repeal. Prohibition cannot be enforced, he declared.

Whether North Carolina votes for repeal or not, the Eighteenth Amendment will be blotted from the constitution on November 7. Mr. Morehead said, "Then why all this agitation in North Caroing reserved for white visitors at lina?" he asked. 
