Roberts and Miss Minnie Sus HOUSING PROGRAM IN LETTER TO CONGRESS

Washington, May 14.-President Roosevelt today set in motion a housing program which officials expect will free billions of dollars for building, repairs and the refinancing of existing debts.

In a special message to Congress asking legislation, he described the purpose of the plan as two-fold:

"First, to return many of the unemployed to useful and gainful occupation; second, to produce tangible, useful wealth in a form for which there is great social and economic need."

A measure had already been prepared and was introduced in the senate by Chairman Fletcher and in the house by Chairman Steagall, of the banking committee.

Instead of the government assuming most of the burden, the administration hopes to enlist the co-operation of private capital through an insurance plan which would, in effect, put federal backing behind 80 per cent of the costs of new construction Wilkes county, preached for the and would guarantee loans for
