Believes Hoey Will Seek Governorship

Mr. Lassiter, of Charlotte, Not Backing Dry From Shelby

Raleigh, July 27. — When Mr. Lassiter, of Charlotte, was here yesterday, people who talked to him were convinced that Clyde E. Hoey, of Shelby, will run for governor.

Mr. Lassiter wasn't boosting him. Indeed, friends of the Charlotte textileist were somewhat surprised to find Mr. Hoey so little acceptable to the big manufacturers as he appeared to be in Mr. Lassiter's brief talk. The Charlottean finds Mr. Hoey even worse wrong on the prohibition question and thinks a good deal of North Carolina's witness may be ascribed to Mr. Hoey's evangelistic evaluation of the issue.

Free translators of Mr. Hoey's position in the 1933 campaign represent him as having declared that liquor sold by bootleggers in every alley would be less objectionable to the Cleveland dry than if sold under state supervision anywhere any time. Mr. Hoey probably didn't say it, but many dries have done so. They will accept no governmental partnership with booze. They desire no color of respectability given it.

Mr. Lassiter, on the other hand, drinks as Mr. Hoey, not at all. But the Charlotte manufacturer does think that crime and debauchery should be made to pay some of their keep.
