Saturday Will Be Tag Day; Mass Meeting On Sunday Afternoon

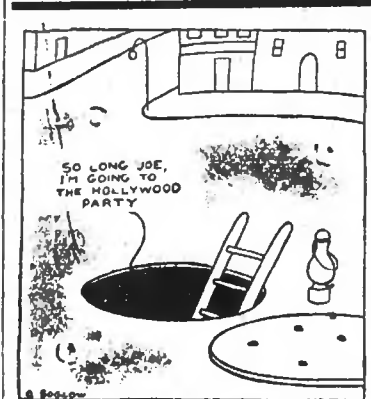
