## Better Personnel In Schools Urged By N.C. Educators

Teachers College President Sees Need Of Increased Salaries In State

Raleigh, Dec. 17.—Improvement of North Carolina's teaching personnel was urged by high-ranking educational leaders of the state, speaking before the state council on the emergency in education here tonight.

B. C. Siske, Pleasant Garden, president of the council, was in charge of the meeting. Speakers included Clyde A. Erwin, superintendent of public instruction in the state, representing public schools; Dr. Frank P. Graham, president of the Greater University of North Carolina, representing institutions of higher learning; and Dr. Leon M. Meadows, president of Eastern Carolina Teachers College, speaking for schools of that type.

Urges Higher Salaries

Meadows, stressing the value of teaching, and appreciation of teachers, their requirements and problems, urged that salaries be increased so as to hold the highest type of teachers in North Carolina.

He also urged appropriation of sufficient funds to provide for needed additional equipment, and emphasized the state's need for changes in curriculum.

In discussing the economic

condition of teachers, Meadows stated as an example Greenville, where teachers were under 40 per cent wage cut while the cost of living had increased 16 per cent.
