Baptist Conference At Raleigh Adjourns

Delegates Leave After Hearing Pat M. Neff Assail Methods Of Education

Raleigh, Jan. 4.—After hearing Pat M. Neff, of Waco, Tex., president of Baylor university and twice governor of Texas, brand as a failure an educational system which does not teach students the value of character and man's duty to God, Southern Baptist Sunday school delegates adjourned their fifth annual conference here today.

The more than 3,000 delegates who were present during the four days of general and departmental meetings tonight were en route to their homes in the 13 states and the District of Columbia. The area embraced by the Southern Baptist convention.

Leaders of the denomination who attended the sessions said the meeting was "a complete success" and said that it stood out in the standards of Christian teachings and leadership.

"Religion must maintain her own schools," Neff declared, "and the business of denominational institution is to provide an all-round education. Unless we provide education of mind, body, and spirit, education may be a power for evil. Denominational institutions never should declare a moratorium on morals."

Lindbergh Star Witness In Trial Of Hauptmann

There was no passion in Lindbergh's voice as he made the identification of Hauptmann's voice, no noticeable change in his manner. He looked at Hauptmann and Hauptmann looked at him.

"Whose voice was it, Colonel, that you heard in the vicinity of St. Raymond's cemetery that night, saying, 'Hey, doctor,' asked Attorney General David T. Wilentz.

"That was Hauptmann's voice," Lindbergh replied. For two and a half hours the cross-examination proceeded. Relying on the testimony from a dozen different angles, he resurrected the case of John Hughes Curtis, Norfolk, Va., shipbuilder, convicted of obstructing justice in the kidnapping investigation; he asked the pilot if he had believed the "Purple gang" of Detroit responsible for the kidnapping.

Lindbergh replied in the negative.

DECAPITATED BODY IS FOUND IN GRAVE

Louisville, Ky., Jan. 6.—The nude and headless torso of a man, believed dead less than 48 hours, was found in a shallow grave at Kosmosdale, 18 miles south of here, this afternoon.

A search started after a dog was seen dragging a human arm through the streets of the village.

Simultaneously with the finding of the torso, county police were notified of the disappearance of Buster Bratcher, 28, a farm hand. Patrolman W. J. Schroerlucke said he had been told by Jack Shipley, Bratcher's employer, that the latter had borrowed a dollar to go to a dance Monday night and had not been seen since.
