QUESTION AND ANSWER

Question: When should lespedeza be sown on small grain?
Answer: To avoid the late freezes lespedeza seed should not be sown before February and, in many cases, this seeding should be held off until about the first of March. The Korean variety germinates in about two weeks and, where this variety is used, the seeding should be made as late as possible. The other varieties germinate in about four or five weeks and may be seeded from two to three weeks earlier than the Korean.

PLAN TO EXTEND RFC FOR 2-YEAR PERIOD

Washington, Jan. 14—Informal congressional hearings said today that "in a few days" administration officials would ask Congress to extend the lending life of the Re-construction Finance Corporation two years.

That extension, however, it was added, would contain a proviso permitting the President to put the organization out of business by proclaiming the emergency ended at the conclusion of one year.

The congressmen, who preferred that their names not be used, reminded that something must be done promptly, for at midnight on January 31 the RFC's authority to make loans expires.

There only 14 working days remain for both house and senate to act on a bill and for the President to sign it.

It was indicated there might be coupled with the extension plan a section doubling the length of time for maturity of loans the RFC may make. The present limit is five years. Likewise, it was said, the RFC might be permitted to extend instead of renew existing loans, provided the security's value is unchanged.

President Roosevelt has told congressional leaders about other minor changes he wants in the emergency financing set-up. So far, however, no specific suggestions have been made to the banking committees on Capitol Hill.
