QUESTION AND ANSWER

Question: When should lespe ieza be sown on small grain? Answer: To avoid the late reezes lespedeza seed should not be sown before February and, in many cases, this seeding should be held off until about the first of March. The Korean variety germinates in about two weeks and, where this variety is used, the seeding should be made as late as possible. The other varieties germinate in seeded from two to three weeks earlier than the Korean.
