Musical In Place Of Spoken Announcements On Coca-Cola Program

One of the interesting and unusual features of the Coca-Cola radio program, coming to you tonight and every Friday night over the NBC Network, and broadcast to North Wilkesboro over station WLW at 10:30 p. m. e. s. t., are the musical announcements. The program is divided into two parts of about fifteen minutes each. An orchestra of sixty-five instrumental artists and twenty-five vocalists play popular melodies. And the orchestra swings from one tune into another without interruptions for spoken announcements of what the new numbers are to be.

How, then, does anyone who is not a musician know what they are playing?

The tunes selected are the popular hits of the movies and the stage and many old favorites. They are familiar melodies, that you should instantly recognize. But just the same, they are announced,—musically. At the beginning of each of the two parts of the program, the melody of each of the pieces to be played is sounded. A male quartet will sing a bar of the chorus of the first tune. A tenor will sing the second. A whole chorus may sound the tune of the third number, and so forth. Thus by listening at the beginning of each part of the program, you catch the announcements of the tunes to be played. Also, before one tune is finished, the title strain of the next is heard with sufficient prominence so that the listener will know it by name.

The Coca-Cola program is directed by Frank Black, famous as a conductor and the musical director of the National Broadcasting Company. In keeping with the manner in which the music of the program flows without interruption, the title of the program is "The Pause That Refreshes On The Air."

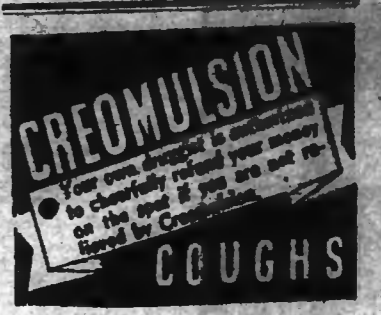
Farmer Is To Stand Trial For Slaying 22 Years Ago

Selma, March 4.—Willis Allen, Igram's township farmer, is facing trial in Johnston county Superior court this month, charged with the murder of Thomas "Clay" Johnson more than 22 years ago.

Johnson was mysteriously murdered December 11, 1912 and for 20 years the affair remained a mystery. In December, 1932, however, a grand jury returned a true bill of indictment against Allen when newly-discovered evidence pointed to him as the murderer. He was arrested and later released under a \$3,000 bond. Unless the case is continued as has occurred several times, Allen will go on trial Monday, March 11.
