Of the amount, \$200,000,000 was recommended for new highway and street work, \$200,000,-000 for grade crossisng elimination, and \$100,000,000 out of the unappropriated balance of the Hayden-Cartwright highway

The \$400,000,000 for new highway, road, street and grade crossing work was distributed according to a formula laid down in the law calling for population, road mileage and railway mileage to be considered.

Highways, roads and streets, \$4,720,137; grade crossing elimination, \$4,823,958; previously authorized \$2,420,470.


