The prepared statement, issued by the company's advertising counsel, said that all employes working at the previous \$5 a day minimum have been advanced to the \$6 a day standard, which, the statement added, was the 1929 minimum wage for the Ford company.

Employes engaged at rates above the minimum were also advanced to higher wage levels through hourly rate increases of five cents and more.
