## 20,000 Persons Killed As Three Earth Shocks Strike Indian City

Karachi, India, May 31.—Three tremendous earth shocks shook and shattered the northwest frontier city of Quetta early today, killing an estimated 20,000 Europeans and natives. It was feared the death toll would go much higher with reports from outlying districts. Tonight many of the dead still lay buried beneath debris, at which exhausted soldiers and volunteer relief workers were frantically tearing. Unnumbered thousands were left homeless, destitute and panic-stricken when the three successive quakes, the most violent the last 60 full seconds, racked their homes to pieces about them.

Scores of British and Indian troops dropped in the streets from sheer exhaustion after unbroken hours of digging into debris, securing the uncounted injured and organizing relief. One relief train left Karachi tonight. Another was being prepared. Messages from Quetta, sent by wireless because land lines were wrecked, said food was enough for several days. Quetta's Norman military and civil population of 60,000 had been swelled by thousands come from the lowland to escape the intense summer heat so that death, when it struck in the darkness of early morning, had so many the more targets.

## Norris Resents High Powers Given Courts

Nebraska Republican Senator Says U. S. Has Government By Injunction

Washington, June 2.—Power of the courts to hold laws unconstitutional today prompted Senator George Norris to describe American government as "a government by injunction." The man who fathered one of the 22 constitutional amendments—the 21st abolishing "lame-duck" sessions of Congress—thinks the courts should not be able to invalidate legislation. But the Republican Independent from Nebraska doesn't believe anything can be done about a constitutional amendment to change the situation in this Congress. "This is the only civilized country in the world," Norris said in an interview, "in which a law passed by the parliament and approved by the executive can be overruled by a Supreme court. "I'm not criticizing the court in any of the decisions it has made, but it does illustrate that we are a government by injunction. "Any district can issue an injunction and prevent the enforcement of any law. This can hold up a law until the case long afterwards reaches the supreme court. If we are going to continue with a system by which the courts can declare laws unconstitutional, there ought to be a way by which decisions could be rendered by the Supreme court in a very short time."

## VETERAN LINOTYPE OPERATOR PASSES

Lenoir, May 31.—"Thirty" for Ronda Horton, veteran linotype operator for the News-Topic, was written today when he succumbed to a three-month illness. He was 57 years of age, and unmarried. For over 40 years he had been engaged in various phases of the printing industry, serving in North Carolina, Tennessee, and other states. Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Mary N. Horton, and five sisters; Mrs. W. T. Love, of Gastonia; Mrs. S. L. Staats, of Portland, Ore.; Mrs. E. D. Pulliam, and Mrs. J. M. Blum, of Lenoir.

## Snake Refuses To Bite

St. Charles, Va., June 2.—The Rev. George Hensley, Holiness revivalist, who has awed large crowds by permitting poisonous snakes to strike his left hand in a demonstration of his "faith cure," handled three large rattlesnakes at services this morning at Ramsey, near here. This time, however, the snakes refused to bite the Rev. Hensley or any of the other five persons who handled them. This the Rev. Hensley attributed to his prayers, citing Biblical passages to support his faith. The services were held out of doors under a grove of cedar trees to permit the large crowd to witness the performance.

## To Commemorate 1st English Bible

Over the signature of John H. Finley, Miss Marston Berry, William Allen White, and Robert E. Speer, announcement was made today of the formation of a national committee to sponsor a nation-wide commemoration of the four hundredth anniversary of the first printed English Bible.

Dr. Finley, speaking for the committee stated, "On October 4, 1535 the first printed English Bible, a translation by Miles Coverdale, was issued from the press. During the four centuries since that date, it has not only surpassed in circulation any other book in the world, but has profoundly influenced the lives of people and the ideals of governments."

"Regional, state, city and church committees throughout the country will be selected at once under the direction of the National Committee to carry out the commemoration program. Additional information and material will be released by the Committee as plans are developed, and as the sub-committees are organized."

Young of the General Electric Company; and the President and Managers of the American Bible Society.
