Washington, June 10.—An amendment to the Lindbergh kidnap law to make persons handling ransom money "accessories after the fact" was passed today by the Senate and sent to the House.

Attorney General Cummings in recommending the amendment said "the present law was inadequate to reach persons handling ransom money."

The bill, he said, would "make it a crime to receive, possess or dispose of the ransom money."

The amendment would subject those handling ransom money to a possible fine of \$10,000 or imprisonment up to 10 years or both.

Around five thousand dollars has been paid in 1935 county taxes by thrifty firms and individuals who wish to take advantage of the three per cent discount allowed on taxes paid this month, it was learned today from C. H. Ferguson, accountant for Wilkes county.

The law allows a discount of three per cent this month and the discount will decrease one-
