Boys Steal Pistol From Officer; Kill Drunk Man

New York, June 17.—Three little boys—two 13 and one 11—were held tonight in Children's Society shelter after arraignment on charges of homicide.

Mute and apparently amazed the youngsters, Frank Damato, 13, and his brother, Julius, 11, two of six motherless children, and Lisbon Lawrence, 13-year-old son of a negro preacher, heard themselves charged with having killed a man with a revolver they had stolen from a policeman.

The youngsters confessed, police said, that they had slain a penniless wanderer in a 'holdup' that ended in nothing.

Seemingly a bit proud, although silent, the youngsters, all bootblacks, stepped firmly before the rail when arraigned in Jamaica magistrate's court. They were without benefit of counsel.
