Check Flasher Is Taken at Bristol

Man and Woman Who Forged Check On Local Attorney Are In Tols of Law

A message was received yesterday by Sheriff W. B. Somers to the effect that Mr. and Mrs. Dewey Smith, wanted on charges of forging checks here and at Elkin, are being held by authorities in Bristol, Tenn.

Smith is alleged to have forged the signature of Attorney R. C. Jennings on a \$12 check and cashed it at T. T. Church's filling station four miles west of this city on July 4. The check was made payable to A. J. Garland. Payment of the check was held up at a local bank because the signature was known not to be that of Attorney Jennings.

The same couple is alleged to have forged Attorney Marlon Allen's name on a \$12 check in Elkin. The Smiths are fighting extradition from Tennessee, it was learned today.

Sheriffs Told Nation Needs To Obey Laws

Hickory, Aug. 14.—"We Americans and North Carolinians should change our attitude toward law observance if we would check the wave of crime sweeping over the state and nation," Clyde R. Hoey, of Shelby, candidate for Governor of the state of "tongued" orator, told the sheriffs of the state tonight in their North Carolina, and "silver-twelfth annual convention here.

Wilmington was selected as the 1936 convention city and Sheriff S. A. Whiteburs, of Greenville, Pitt county, was elected president of the Sheriffs' Association to succeed Sheriff O. D. Adkins, of Marion.

Other officers elected are Sheriff O. D. Barrs, Hickory, first vice president; C. O. Robinson, Gastonia, second vice president, and John R. Morris, Wilmington, re-elected secretary.

Retiring officers aside from Mr. Adkins are Sheriff N. H. McGehy, Fayetteville, and J. Trainsou Scott, Winston-Salem.

AVIATOR SERIOUSLY INJURED IN CRASH

Lenoir, Aug. 14.—Charles Broach, Jr., youthful aviation enthusiast, tonight remained in a critical condition following the crash at dusk yesterday of a small, one-place unlicensed airplane in a cornfield near the Lenoir Airport.

The plane was completely demolished when it fell from an estimated height of 150 feet. It belonged to Henry Burgess, local youth. Broach, an unlicensed pilot is experienced in flying and is a well known young mechanic. He was married about six weeks ago. No definite cause for the mishap, which was the first of its kind of any consequence here, has been announced. Broach was alone when the crash occurred, and has remained unconscious with a concussion of the brain since the accident.
