Mount Mitchell is Being Developed into State Park

Mount Mitchell, the highest mountain east of the Rockies, is being developed into a North Carolina state park by a civilian conservation corps company located on the mountain side not far from the 6,711-foot peak.

THE FUNCTIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

No one major phase of the Constitution gave the delegates to the Convention of 1787 more trouble than that of working out a feasible plan for the execution of the laws adopted by the Congress.

Should we have a king? That was seriously debated, and rejected. Should there be an executive committee of three to administer the laws? That was considered, but dismissed.

Each State has as many electors as it has Senators and Representatives in Congress. If a State wants to have its Presidential electors appointed by the Governor or the Legislature, as was the early way of doing it, it can still do so.

Very early in our national history conflicts began to develop between the President and Congress. Some Presidents have acted upon the theory that they were authorized to do whatever was not forbidden by the Constitution.
