\$154,000 Is Tentatively Fixed as Surry WPA Fund

Elkin, Aug. 29.—In a special conference of the Surry county board of commissioners and W. H. Powell, of the district WPA office at Dobson Tuesday, the county officials were told that \$154,000 is the tentative allotment for Surry county.

The county commissioners approved projects to be constructed with government funds which will provide employment to approxi-

mately 100 men and 300 women on the Surry relief rolls.

For the construction of a new high school building in Elkin, approximate cost of which will be \$60,000, the county has set aside \$15,000. On the basis of a 45 per cent grant from WPA, a total of \$27,270 will be available for the purpose, it is understood.
