### Several Thousand Be Spent In Wilkes

Road To Be Improved From Purlear All Way To Traphill Community

A number of projects calling for improvement of what is known as secondary or farmto-market roads in Wilkes county were among the list of North Carolina works progress administration projects approved last week by President Roosevelt.

Total federal expenditures approved for Wilkes roads so far are in excess of \$80,000 and it is learned that other projects on roads are on the pending list.

It is expected that work will begin as early as possible in order to provide jobs for relief cases. The re-employment office here will serve as a referring agency.

The projects listed as approved by the president are as follows:

Road improvement for 17 miles Wooten Creek-Vannoy road one mile north of Mulberry to Vannoy community and to horseshoe bend on highway number 18 near Alleghaby line; cost \$21,983.

Widen, regrade and gravel surface roads about Roaring River; cost \$4,352.

Generally improving road from Millers Creek school to Mulberry-Purlear road; cost \$4,340.

Regrade, drain and widen road from Old Popular Springs to Ronda; federal funds \$2,sponsor's contribution 608;

Generally improving road from Purlear community across northern part of county into Abshers and Traphill communities; federal funds \$22,-702; sponsor's contribution \$125

General road improvements in Ronda community 19.5 miles; cost \$8,548.

Widening and improving road from Cricket postoffice on Boone Trail to Hendrix community; cost \$19,252.

### **Jefferson Road Project Sent To** Capital For O.K.

Calls For Grading, Structures and Surfacing On 7.3

FOR EARLY LETTING Next Letting Will Probably

Be On October 3; Approval Is Expected News that contract will be let

at an early date for construction of the Millers Creek-Jefferson road from Wilbar to the Ashe county line is welcomed by the people of both Wilkes and Ashe

This project, calling for grading, structures and gravel surfacing, has been sent by the state highway and public works commission to the federal bureau of roads for approval, which is expected in time for letting early in October. A news dispatch from Raleigh stated that the next letting will probably be on Octob-

The project for which approval is sought calls for 7.3 miles of relocated road, which will extend from the end of the present roadbed at Wilbar to the Ashe county line at or near the intersection with the great scenic parkway survey.

This road is one of the most important thoroughfares that has not been completed in Northwestern North Carolina. It will be the best and most difect route from Ashe county to piedmont North Carolina and will be of great benefit to Ashe county as well as a large section of Wilkes.


