R. H. McNEILL NOT AFTER NOMINATION FOR GOVERNORSHIP

iciencies, should head the state ticket."

Mr. McNeill, an attorney, has spent a great part of his time in Washington, and friends feel that in the national capital he has acquired knowledge of public affairs and public policies which should prove very valuable to the state in the event of his nomination and election to the governorship. Parenthetically, he is much opposed to "the submergence of the states and the continued encroachment by the federal government upon the rights of the states." He considers as "very unfortunate" the spectacle of "the state going, with its hat in its hand, to Washington every time it wants something."

Although it is true that Mr. McNeill states in plain language that he is "not seeking the nomination for the governorship of this great commonwealth," it also is true that a careful reading of his statement fails to disclose any unequivocal declaration that he will not make the race for the governorship next year.

Liberty Theatre Has New Sound

Latest Western Electric Wide Range System is Now Being Used.

The latest and most modern sound system devised by the Western Electric company has been installed at the Liberty Theatre and is now being used.

The new system represents a great improvement over the one formerly used in that it is wide range sound that brings out every tone and frequency that were lacking with other systems and covers the house thoroughly in such a manner that sound can be heard distinctly in every seat in the theatre.

The new system has only been out of Western Electric laboratories for about 30 days and, according to the engineer who was here to install it, it is the first to be used in North Carolina.

Virginia Undertaker Facing Charges of Murder in Knife Death of 21-Year-Old Bride

Washington, Oct. 15. — Jail doors slammed against William H. Peaguer, 50-year-old Culpeper, Va., undertaker, tonight after a coroner's jury ordered him held in the fatal slaying of Mrs. Willie Mae Wood, 21-year-old bride of three weeks.

A charge of murder rested against Reaguer after the jurymen ordered him held for the grand jury. He was not admitted to bail. This decision was reached after the jury heard a bizarre story of a five-year romance that ended when police found Mrs. Wood in a Washington hotel early last Saturday, her throat slashed from ear to ear. By her side lay Reaguer, his wrists and arms backed. Garbled, tanned and plainly nervous, Reaguer, the father of two married daughters, did not take the stand at today's proceedings.
