Raleigh, Oct. 18 Automobile accidents claimed 116 lives in North Carolina in September, only one less than the record highway death toll for one month

In nine months this year automobile accidents claimed 757 lives in the state, 110 more than dent of W. C. U. N. C. at Greens- the 647 killed in the similar

Compilation of the September statistics was not complete, R. R. McLaughlin, director of the motor vehicle bureau said, but it was shown that drunken drivers figured in 82 non-fatal accidents.

The death list of 116 for September this year was 10 names longer than in September, 1934, and 711 injured last month exceeded the 646 hurt in the similar month last year.
